U.S. TO DENY HUNGARY PLANE'S RELEASE

WASHINGTON (AP)—The State Department said today the United States will take immediate action to free the four-man crew and an American Army plane reported forced down in Communist Hungary.

Like 'Flattered' By Regard Of House Members

General Still Mum On His Availability

WASHINGTON (AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower says he is "flattered" to learn he is regarded by many House members as "President's man."

The New York Congressman recently took a poll of House Republicans which gave Eisenhower 54 in first votes for the Presidential nomination.

In releasing the poll, Cole said he could not really understand Eisenhower's position, and he added: "His entire effort is toward the effective organization of the North Atlantic Treaty alliance and resistance to further Communist aggression."

DECISION ENDED Those seeking to get into the Republican Presidential race have made a statement early next year to help them convince prospective GOP convention delegates that he is a Republican and is available if the nomination comes his way.

On the other hand, some Eisenhower supporters apparently believe the General can ignore public opinion concerning his nomination.

This group argues that failure of Eisenhower to take the name out of the March 11 New Hampshire primary—where he got Sherman Adams as said it will be placed—would be enough of a signal that the General is willing to run.

Sen. Monroney (D-Okla.) told reporters Monday the General's letter doesn't commit him either for or against seeking the nomination.

Communists Make Inspection Offer

MUNSAN, Korea (AP)—Communist truce negotiators today proposed behind-the-lines inspection by neutral observers of a "complete freeze" of troops and arms in Korea, possibly paving the way for agreement on another step toward an armistice.

The move appeared to be a major concession on the part of the Reds. In the past they have refused adamantly to allow observers behind their lines and have insisted on the right to build up their armaments while an armistice is in force.

The surprise compromise plan immediately drew from Allied envoys more than a score of searching questions.

The big one—what the 854 question—was what neutral nations do the Communists have in mind to police the truce?

The Communists said they would answer 21 questions posed by the U.N. Command when the negotiators meet in Panmunjom at 11 a.m. Tuesday (9 p.m. EST Monday).

The offer to permit inspection teams behind Communist lines was the Reds' biggest concession, even though they stipulated that any such inspection should be limited to "mutually agreed upon points of contact."

The Reds sprang their surprise proposal at an afternoon session Monday. They participated in the meeting the two sides appeared deadlocked on the problem of supervision of an armistice.

"854 question"—which nations the Communists consider neutral—might prove a major stumbling block.

Among countries officially neutral in the Korean War are such nations as Czechoslovakia, Poland and the Balkan States.

On the other hand, there are relatively few Western countries that have participated directly in the war or supported the Allies through votes in the United Nations.

1. Neither side would introduce into Korea "any military forces, weapons and ammunition under any pretext during the truce."

Chinese Reds Capture Island

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Chinese amphibious force drove South Korean guerrillas off an island near the Yalu River mouth Friday in the face of opposition by three British ships and planes from a U. S. carrier.

The North Korean radio, in a broadcast heard in Tokyo asserted the Reds had captured the Allied-held islands—Togwa, Sowha and Yul—killing more than 500 Allied soldiers.

The Navy, reporting the loss of Togwa Island today, tied the air bases to the previous announced destruction of 12 Red planes, including eight bombers, by U. S. Air Force Sabre fighters.

The Navy said about 1,000 Chinese took part in the overcast, as the bombers assigned here operated from the island which has been used as an Allied raiding base for several months.

The British cruiser Cerberus, destroyer Cochrane and the Canadian destroyer Athabaskan three gunboats to the Reds and evacuated them from the island.
