Artillery Opens Up Chinese Attacks Are Smashed

TOKYO (AP)—Thundering Allied artillery today smashed a series of Chinese attacks which Lt. Gen. James A. Van Fleet warned may be forerunners of a new Red offensive in Korea.

The United Nations ground commander foresaw no "major thrust immediately." But, he said on a tour of the fighting front, "the Chinese appear to be building up for another effort" to overrun U.N. lines.

BUDAPEST, Hungary (AP)—Roman Catholic Archbishop Iosif Gruz was convicted today of plotting to overthrow the Communist Government of Hungary and was sentenced to fifteen years in prison.

The other eight defendants tried with the archbishop were sentenced to death. He is Hungary's first Catholic leader to be sentenced to prison for life.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The State Dept. announced today that Russia has proposed the United Nations, North Korean and Red Chinese commanders negotiate a Korean armistice.

The proposal was made yesterday by Ambassador Alan G. Kirk, Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Gromyko in Moscow.
