WHAT NOW IN IRAN?

IT is the hope of the Western World, and at the moment not a far-fetched one, that the Iranian crisis will "blow over" as did the Berlin Blockade crisis in 1948. Whether it will dissipate itself depends largely on three

variables:

(1) The Iranian temper or temperament.
(2) British willingness to take part in a fair compromise.
(3) The action or inaction of the Soviet

This, then appears to be the status of the Iranian crisis: there is a good prospect for settlement if the British and Iranians agree to discuss in good faith the nationalization of the fields but there is an immediate danger of Russian intervention coupled with an uprising of the well-armed and millitant Tudeh (Communist) Party in Iran if the issue is not settled soon. There is also the grim possibility that settlement of the matter between the British and Mossadegh's government will be construed as a "sell-out" by the extremelist, resulting in a "popular front," millitary coalition of the Reds and souch fanatical religious sects as Fedsyan Islam.
