ONE INJURED IN ACCIDENT NEAR MONROE

Charlotte Man One Of Victims

MONROE — Two men were killed and another critically injured in a two-truck collision near here about 4 A. M. today.

The dead were identified by McEwen Funeral Home here as Robert Canady, 29, 2327 1/2 Apartments, Charlotte.

Dr. W. M. Smeith of the Wadesboro Hospital said Canady suffered a broken jaw and nose, other head injuries and first and third degree burns about his shoulders and arms.

Freeland returned to the names of Canady and Smeith when questioned by Dr. Smeith and said they were supposed to be with him.

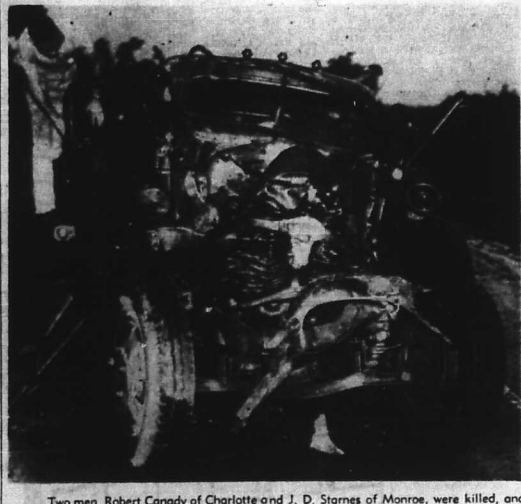
According to Denton Williams, who was on the Jock truck, the wreck occurred about two miles east of Wadesboro.

Subversive Body Members OK'd

WASHINGTON — The Senate Judiciary Committee today approved three long-pending nominations to the Subversive Activities Control Board but took no action on a fourth—that of Charles M. La Follette.

La Follette, former Republican House member from Indiana, is now acting chairman of the board.

Members of the judiciary committee said they did not act on the nominations approved were those of Peter Campbell Brown of New York, a former Justice Department attorney; David J. Cook, a Boston lawyer at one time with the old maritime commission; and Kathryn McAlister, Indiana education officer.

The board was created under internal security law passed by Congress last September over President Truman's veto.

Military Committee Wins Point

WASHINGTON — Senators contending the proposed \$8,500,000 Foreign Aid program primarily a military rather than a foreign relations matter, won a point today.

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee bowed to demands from the Armed Services Committee and agreed that the latter group act jointly with it on the measure.

The decision was taken over the opposition when their 1953 session opened Monday at 11 A.M. (8 P. M. Monday, EST).

The United Nations committee on the Korean situation was also involved. There is a move under way to deny Secretary of State Acheson the policy direction over the \$8,500,000, 000 is distributed.

A U. N. spokesman said: "The first and necessary step is in the immediate offing."

Slaughter Quota Bill Offered

WASHINGTON — (U. S. SENATE) — Senators Capahart (R-Ind.) and Maybank (D-S.C.) today introduced legislation to permit the Government to fix livestock slaughter quotas.
