Item 1: In a move to assure continuing cogress of off-street parking garage projects rogress of off-street parking garage projects juring its Summer recess. The Buffalo, N. Y. common Council directed the City's public ords commissioner to puts' architects and ngineers to work on plans for four new worknown parking ramps. Cost of the four rojects is estimated at between \$6,500,000 of \$7,000,000.
