SENDS MINERS BACK TO WORK

Red Artillery Drives Marines From Crest

Leathernecks Leave Recaptured Peak

SEOUL, Korea — Punishing Red Artillery fire tonight drove U. S. Marines off the crest of "The Hook" a few hours after they recaptured the western ridge line in bitter close-quarter fighting.

A Marine officer said the front said the Leathernecks pulled back from the crest and forward slopes at 8:55 p. m. There was no indication whether the Chinese Communists moved up to occupy the high ground. The Reds carrier had attacked about 2,000 men along a three-mile front.

The Marine officer said "The Communists made only a small penetration in our line. It was contained and never got out of hand."

Matches Like Campaign
Stevenson's accusation that the Republicans are planning a last-minute smear campaign matched the statement from the Eisenhower camp last night that the Democrats are planning a "below-the-belt" charge.

McCarthy is scheduled to talk from Chicago (9:30-10 p. m. EST) over a nationally televised broadcast. Gov. Sherman Adams of New Hampshire Eisenhower's campaign manager—said in a statement in New York that the general's political enemies planned to "stop at nothing this week" to win the election.

SAYS POLICES UNKNOWN
Stevenson told the KYC gathering: "We are only a week away from our election and we still don't know precisely what the Republicans propose to do about much of anything."

On foreign policy which perhaps is our most important concern, I have an idea that that is by design and intention. He repeated that Eisenhower was "getting on the wrong bus" when he said he would go to Korea in an effort to find ways and means of ending the war there. And he insisted the war would be settled in Moscow—and not Korea.

Stevenson defended the Democrats and then said that "We must press every effort to counteract, to neutralize and to turn back the poison forces of imperialist communism which the men in the Kremlin seek to spread across the whole world."

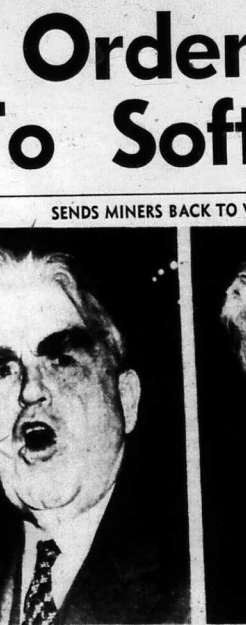

Ike Stands On Korean Views

ABRAHAM LINCOLN
—President Dwight D. Eisenhower, opening his final drive for reelection, said today that he will not be turned aside by any criticism from the view that South Korean troops should man the major portion of the battlefield in Korea against the Communists.

He held a Philadelphia crowd jammed into the big concourse of the Pennsylvania Railroad's 30th St. Station that he holds this view "entirely aside from any political considerations."

He repeated his determination to go to Korea himself if he is elected president. This statement, first made last Friday in Detroit, brought a barrage of critical comment from the Democrats and Eisenhower apparently was referring to this reaction when he said he would not be affected by criticism.

EDGE RIDICULED
Gov. Adlai Stevenson, his Democratic opponent for the presidency, has ridiculed Eisenhower's pledge, declaring that the solution to the Korean War lies in Moscow and not in Korea.

The GOP nominee's first campaign talk of this final week in the week came before a cheering crowd in the 750-foot long, marble-floored concourse. Police Commissioner Thomas Gibbons said about 4,000 persons were in the huge amphitheater.

Two bands played. The crowd waved campaign placards and chanted "We Want Ike" as the general arrived in the room from his special train parked on a lower level. He stood on a low platform.

Self-Defense Orders Are Given Air Force

—The Air Force is leaving to its "lots and overseas commanders the decision of what to do if Soviet fighters gain attack American planes flying peaceable missions over non-Russian territory."

MAY USE ESCORTS

The spokesman said "The decision whether or not to assign a fighter-plane escort when needed is a tactical consideration which will be decided by the commander of the aircraft on the spot."

President Campaigning In Midwest

WITH TRUMAN —By-Crowd that he called an assurance of John L. Lewis' co-operation in ending the soft coal strike. President Truman moved into the Midwest today on the final swing of his campaign to make Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson his successor in the White House.

After the meeting, Truman, who has drawn some Republican criticism that his presidential duties have been neglected during the political campaign, issued a statement saying:

"I have... urged Mr. Lewis... to use his best efforts to effect at once a resumption of work in the mines. Mr. Lewis has assured me of his co-operation."

IN GOOD HUMOR
When he arrived at the station to spend the night aboard his train, which left for Gary, Ind., at 4:30 a. m. (EST), Truman appeared to be in unusually good humor.

At Gary tonight, he will deliver the first of six speeches in his campaign which will take him to Indiana, Minnesota, Michigan, Illinois, Iowa, Ohio and Missouri — with major speeches Tuesday night at Hibbing, Minn.; Wednesday night, Chicago; Thursday night, Detroit; Friday night, Cincinnati; and Saturday night, St. Louis.

The St. Louis speech will wind up his major campaigning.
