Reds Fail To Speak On Compromise

(AP)—Soviet-posed Poland, which had been expected to give the Red leaders to India's compromising Gowran plan, suddenly decided this morning not to speak in the U. N.'s 50-nation political committee. Poland has already spoken once on the Korean question and said Wednesday that the next time would be to comment on the Indian proposals. The Soviet satellite said last night it was ready, but apparently Warsaw—and inferentially the Kremlin—decided overnight it was not yet prepared either to endorse or condemn the Indian initiative.

Michigan Senate Dispute May Affect GOP Control

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate Republicans, faced with a precarious margin in the new Congress, were keeping close watch today on a post-election senatorial battle in Michigan. Rep. Charles E. Potter, a Republican, ousted Democratic Sen. Elmer Moody at Michigan's polls Nov. 4, according to an official canvass which had Potter ahead by 45,038 votes. Yesterday the Senate elections subcommittee, which had been asked to investigate what State Democratic Chairman Neil Steuber termed many irregularities in the count, requested that official notice of Potter's election be held up pending completion of a preliminary probe.

Freak Snow Makes Dixie Polar Outpost

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP)—A quirk of shifting air masses dumped up to 22 inches of snow yesterday on mountain areas of four Southern States—Tennessee, North Carolina, Virginia and Kentucky—paralyzing communications and transportation for many hours. Despite rapid melting caused by relatively high ground temperatures, the unexpected storm left a large area of ill-prepared Dixie looking like a polar outpost. The snow blanket measured 10 inches here today.

NEW YORK (AP)—Herbert Brownell Jr., designated by President-elect Eisenhower as the next attorney general, indicates he will re-examine all criminal and civil cases pending in the Department of Justice when he assumes office. Criminal prosecutions are pending against some key figures in the Truman administration, accused of dereliction of duty, while other investigations may result in actual charges.

AFL Council To Pick New Chief

WASHINGTON (AP)—The 14-member executive council of the AFL will meet here next Tuesday to elect a new president of the big labor federation. AFL headquarters announced today. Secretary - Treasurer George Meany notified the executive council of the meeting which is expected to bring a quick agreement on a successor to William Green who died in Coeburn, Ohio, yesterday. The council is composed of Meany and all 13 AFL vice presidents. Meany himself is regarded as the likely next president. He is 58 years old and has been running the eight-million member federation in Coeburn, Ohio, since 1945.

Rolling California Quake Fells House

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—A rolling earthquake collapsed a house at Ocean and reached the California coast, although the San Andreas fault before and after midnight today. No deaths or injuries were reported, although the quake shook earth fall, which nearly all of California's disastrous quakes have occurred since the San Andreas fault broke in 1906. Charles Herrick, on the University of California seismological staff, said the quake started at 1:47:14 p.m. PST, lasted 37.47 seconds, and followed its epicenter near Parkfield in the mountains of Southeastern Monterey County, 120 miles south of Berkeley. The seismograph continued recording the quake for more than 45 minutes and Herrick declared damage "undoubtedly would have been disastrous had the epicenter been in populated country."

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
