Biggest Chinese Attack in Month

Reds Throw Koreans Off Hill

SEoul, S. Korea—Chinese Communists stashed through withering Allied artillery fire today to hurl South Korean defenders from Little North Hill on the western front for the second time in 17 hours.

Frontline officers said the Reds hurled 3,000 men into the attacks, their biggest in a month.

South Korean troops withdrew at dusk in the face of a two-company (300 to 350 men) Communist attack. The Chinese advanced through a thundering 1,000-pound artillery barrage from their own guns.

Associated Press Milo Farnet reported that the front that Communist troops were attacking had been in the hands of the Reds since the last week of the year.

An estimated 10,000 rounds of artillery and mortar fire fell on Allied positions.

Farnet said the Reds suffered an estimated 270 casualties—150 killed and at least 115 wounded.

The Chinese had captured Little North Hill earlier, but the South Koreans had retaken it after a day of fierce counterattacks.

Despite a barrage of 2,000 Red shells.

Some 200 Allied warplanes buried heavy blows at Red positions on the Western Front.

NO MICH

For the first time in five days, no Russian-Bulgarian MIG jet planes came on to fight.

Reports from the front said the Communists wrested the south slope of nearby Big North Hill from the South Koreans, who were making no effort to regain that ground.

The Reds already held the north slope.

An estimated 8,000 rounds of Communist artillery and mortar fire pounded the South Koreans since the Red attacks jumped off.

Frontline reports said Allied and Chinese big guns were engaged in a thunderous duel Thursday afternoon.

Both Big and Little North Hill are located along the Imjin River in the North Korean zone.

The Chinese Reds hurled three main assaults in the area early Thursday, with the North heights the principal targets.

The Red attack on the smaller slope apparently spilled over to Big North Hill in the confused, close-range fighting that raged before dawn.

TAIPEI, Formosa.—(AP)—The control yuan—watchdog agency of the Chinese Nationalist Government—today censured the weather bureau for losing a typhoon.

It declared Cheng Tzue-chang failed to properly chart the course of a disastrous typhoon, so that it struck Formosa Nov. 14 without warning. The storm left 151 persons dead or missing, 392 injured, 9,730 houses destroyed and 14,020 damaged.

AIR CURRENTS CAUSE RADAR SCREEN 'BLIPS'

WASHINGTON (AP)—Dense, swirling sheets of air high in the sky may have caused false "blips" to show up on radar sets, touching off last summer's reports of flying saucers.

The Civil Aeronautics Administration (CAA) said Wednesday wind eddies can bend a radar beam downward so that it picks up an object on the ground and makes it look like something floating high in the heavens.

When the unidentified blips, or spots on radar screens, were picked up last summer by airport radar sets the popular belief was that only solid objects on which radar was directly focused would show up.

The CAA announcement is in accord with an Air Force report last July that a temperature inversion could deflect radar waves and cause false images on the set.

In an analysis of all the flying saucer radar "lightings" on its records, the CAA said many of them apparently were caused by "secondary reflections" caused by bent radar beams.

The Air Force since 1947 has studied more than 2,000 reports of visual sightings of strange objects in the air, and most have been traced to misidentification of aircraft, balloons, or electrical or meteorological phenomena. Some remain unexplained.

\$1.5 Million Bequest Announced By Duke

DURHAM (AP)—Duke University has received a \$1,500,000 fund from the Duke Endowment for distinguished professors, President Hollis Edens announced at Founder's Day exercises here this morning.

Dr. Edens said, as the James B. Duke Professorship Fund, the fund will be used in order that "the university may be in a position to continue to attract and develop in its faculties and staff a group of distinguished and outstanding persons."

The announcement came as a surprise to the several hundred members of the faculty, student body and alumni gathered here to witness the celebration of the 28th anniversary of the founding of Duke University.

Enthusiastic applause greeted President Edens' statement, "It is my happy privilege to tell you that the Duke Endowment has made available to the university a fund of \$1,500,000 to be known as the James B. Duke Professorship Fund."

The income from the fund "will be made available over a period of years," he said.

Edens said he was "pleased to say that the Duke Endowment is fully aware of the importance of the problem. The measure of their awareness is indicated in this magnificent gift."

"It is an confidence that we will rejoice with me in this announcement, especially in the intended use of the gift. It is my hope that this will be the creation of many large bequests which will come to the university for this purpose from foundations, corporations and men of philanthropy."

It was on Dec. 11, 1924, that the late James B. Duke affixed his signature to the indenture providing for the creation of the fund.

Truman Plans To Replace WSB Members

President Lashes At Both Generals

Truman Plans To Replace WSB Members

President Strives To Keep Controls

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman today rejected suggestions that he hold a White House conference with Generals Eisenhower and MacArthur—and he blasted both of them.

Truman called President-elect Eisenhower's campaign announcement that he would go to Korea a piece of demagoguery.

And he told his news conference that MacArthur should have reported to him after he returned from Japan following MacArthur's ouster last year. Truman said that is what any decent man would have done.

Truman spoke up in response to questions arising from MacArthur's speech to the National Association of Manufacturers in New York last Friday in which he said that "there is a clear and definite solution" to the Korean conflict.

Earlier this week, Eisenhower messaged MacArthur that he would be happy to meet with him to discuss any plans the former Far Eastern commander might have for ending the Korean War.

Eisenhower sent his telegram to MacArthur from the cruiser on which he is returning from the Korean trip he undertook to carry out his campaign for reelection.

Truman then challenged MacArthur to tell him any ideas he may have for ending the war. He said it was MacArthur's duty.

PARLEY SUGGESTED

Some congressmen had suggested Truman meet with both the President-elect and MacArthur to try to achieve a program for peace.

MacArthur did not say flatly that he knew a way to end the Korean war. What he said was: "I am confident there is a clear and sound solution to the Korean conflict."

Truman told his news conference today that he thinks the President-elect and MacArthur are in a "parley" over the actual ending of the war.

A Defense Department spokesman said Tuesday he was not aware of any plan for a meeting with the President-elect and MacArthur.

Truman came to his news conference today obviously ready to battle with the two generals. He dramatized the conference, he permitted still photographers and television and newsreel cameramen to make pictures of the actual questioning started.

The TV films were made for the use of the news conference. Truman said he traveled more than 14,000 miles to see MacArthur at Wake Island where he met him near and asking her to kiss him.
