WITH the appointment of AFL leader Martin P. Durkin as Secretary of Labor, and Sinclair Weeks as Secretary of Commerce, Eisenbewer's Cabinet is complete. From these nine officials and two appointees who will beer similar responsibility, MSA administrator Stassen and U. N.
