KORE ISLAND, Korea (AP)—Eight Red prisoners were killed and 13 wounded in bloody incidents at United Nations prisoner of war camps on Kore Island and on the Korean mainland yesterday and today.

Prison Camp Reprisals Are Hinted By Reds

MUNSAN, Korea (AP)—The Communist chief trustee yesterday called the killing of a Red prisoner on Kore Island an atrocity and he dropped the usual veiled hint of possible reprisals against Allied prisoners held in North Korea.

United Nations authorities on Kore Island reported one Communist prisoner was killed and another wounded Thursday by the accidental discharge of a guard's rifle.

North Korean Gen. Nam II demanded that the Allies "immediately stop these atrocities." Then he told the U.N. delegation: "I do not clearly remind you that to protect the war prisoners is a mutual and reciprocal responsibility of both belligerents. You should not fail to see the consequences of your action."

U.S. authorities in the 40-minute press conference said that the prisoners in Tokyo, Seoul and Kojima were "in good health" and today in new disorders.

The U.S. State Department said today that it found only 70,000 of its 130,000 captives were willing to return to Communist territory.

In Washington the State Department said the U.N. Command "is in a position to release 50,000 prisoners in the Geneva conference."

TAFT BACKERS HATE HITLER'S RECORD

Bare-Knuckle Attack Made In Heated Midwestern Primary

A frontal attack on Dwight Eisenhower's record, launched by Sen. Robert Taft's forces South Dakota today, heightened the political clangor greeting the general's imminent arrival home.

The Ohio senator's supporters bought a newspaper advertising space to assail Eisenhower, due in Washington Sunday. The general resigned as Allied defense chief in Europe to be available for the Republican presidential nomination if offered.

The advertisements underscored Taft's record of the Taft-Eisenhower duel for South Dakota's GOP Presidential nomination. Taft was chosen in a primary Tuesday.

Eisenhower backers campaigning there have contended Taft favors "some kind of UMT but not other measures" and that the military draft has taken many youths off the farms.

Big topic on the Democratic side was Vice President Alben Barkley's announced willingness to be elected and elected, the "veep" at it would be the oldest man ever to be a major candidate.

Barkley's statement that "while not a candidate in the regular election" he would accept a Democratic nomination—brought cheers from supporters throughout his home state of Kentucky.

Sen. Estes Kefauver, who leads in the polls in Tennessee, also pledged his 28 votes for a national ticket with Gov. Frank P. Battle of Missouri.

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Truman Greeted Acheson, lauds European Pact

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman's greeting Secretary of State Acheson at National Airport, declared today that the pact aligning West Germany with the Western Anti-Communist Bloc had made a "great contribution to the peace of the world."

Acheson signed the German peace contract at Bonn, observed the signing of a European defense treaty at Paris and announced the North Atlantic Treaty broadening security guarantees to include West Germany.

Acheson stepped down the ramp from Truman's own plane and stepped out of the White House to greet the president's wife.

Acheson thanked the President for meeting him and his party. The two men then exchanged formal statements for the record.

Acheson turned away, the President patted him on the back and said "You'll be successful. I'm not worried for a moment about that."

State Department aides said Acheson will make a full report to the President Monday. He will address the nation over radio and television Monday night.

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Free Killed As Japanese Reds Clash With Police

TOKYO (AP)—Three communists were killed today as Communist Party demonstrators clashed with police in a North Tokyo park.

The three were killed when police opened fire on a crowd of about 200 demonstrators who advanced on a police box in a northern suburb, Itabashi.

Police had warned the crowd that they would shoot if the demonstrators advanced any closer. They had reached a point about 10 feet from the box.

The crowd surged forward, throwing bottles of acid and stones. Police opened fire. The crowd scattered.

Small demonstrations were reported throughout Japan. Late press reports placed the number of arrests at nearly 100.

Two policemen and three newsmen were injured at Shinjuku. About 15 demonstrators were arrested there.

One of the newsmen hurt was Associated Press Correspondent William G. Barnard.
