URBAN REDEVELOPMENT - ALIVE A ND KICKING

PROM time to time, there have been ref-erences in local newspapers to the prob-ability that urban redevelopment in Charlotte may be besding into a blind alley, i. e., that because many of Charlotte's substandard houses have been brought up to standard by equipping them with lights, baths, screens, there are no longer any blighted areas to be

There are no one-redeveloped. That impression was spread initially by some casual remarks made at a meeting of the Urban Redevelopment Committee some weeks ago when one particular section of the state enabling act was under discussion. The question stems from a subsection of the act defining a "blighted area". It reads

si follows:
"Bilighted area"—shall mean an area in
which there is a predominance of buildings
or improvements (or which is predominanwhich there is a predominance or improvements
(or which is predominanmeans of dilapidation, deterioration, age or
choolescence, inadequate provision for
ventilation, light, air, sanitation, or open
spaces, high density of population and overcreding numarior, or open
spaces, high density of population and
ventualition, light, air, sanitation, or open
spaces, high density of conditions which endanger life or property by fire and other
causes, or any combination of such factors,
gubstantially impairs the sound growth of
the community, is conductive to ill beatth,
juvenile delinquentry and crime, and is
detrimental to the public health, safety,
morale or welfare:

Trevided, no find issue caused the property
of any blighted area nor subject to the
power of eminent domain herein granted
unless it is of the character herein de-

scribed and substantially contributes to the conditions rendering such area blighted."

1. The slum shack, which falls completely within the definition, except for the fact that it qualifies as "standard" under Charlotte's local standard bousing ordinance. In the opinion of the Urban Redevelopment Commission members, the vast majority of the renovated slum houses still qualify under the "blighted area" definition, and they anticipate no difficulty in buying them, other than a routine court test.

2 The provise. It was obviously the in-tent of the General Assembly to limit the use of eminent domain in buying a modern building that happens to be inside a blighted area. Faced with that provise, the Commis-sion has two alternatives: (A) it can work out a development plan that twill include the structure in question, or (B) it can seek, in co-operation with the N. C. Real Estate Board and the League of Municipalities, the original sponsors of the enabling act, to pre-original sponsors of the enabling act, to pre-tain the control of the control of the 1893 General Assembly.

The Urban Redevelopment law is new.
There are many sections that may pose
problems. It is rare that any major new piece
of legislation stands through the years with-

out amendment.
But to infer, because there are problems
ahead, that urban redevelopment will be completely stymied, is to underestimate the capacity of earnest men to compromise differences, and to treat too lightly the urgent
need for clearing out these blighted urban

BECAUSE they involve only one, two or DECAUSE they involve only one, two or three persons, fatal accidents involving small boats don't rate the scare headlines that herald an air linner crash, a polic epi-demic, or the sinking of a big excursion craft. Even so, small boats are dangerous, especially in the hot Summer months. Just how dangerous is revealed in a current study by one of the big life insurance com-

panies.

About 1,200 persons a year drown as a result of accidents involving small boats. In 1949, motorboats, rowboats, canoes and the like accounted for four out of every five drownings from water transportation mis-

drownings from week.

The months from June through August
take the biggest toll. The 15-to-24-year age
woun contributes one-quarter of the total

mortality. Motor-driven craft, mostly out-board motor types, cause three-fifths of the drownings.

In some 60 per cent of the drownings, the person was fishing. Cruising or rowing about for pleasure took an additional one-fifth of the lives. Sudden storms. high winds and dangerous water conditions were held responsible for many of the drownings. Other causes: overcrowding, speeding, riding waves, sharp turning, changing places in midstream.

The small boat is a vehicle, for pleasure. It can also become a grim death-dealer when operated careleastly by an inexperienced person. As the hot days of the Summer roll by, it would be well for pleasure-seekers to remember that fact.
