

Navy, Air Force Join POWER PLANTS BOMBED AGAIN

SEOUL, Korea.—(AP)—Air Force and Navy fighters teamed up again today to hammer four of the five Communist hydro-electric plants smashed yesterday in the biggest air raid of the Korean war.

THAWING OUT

None of the planes returned to the smoldering Suho power plants just south of the Yalu River border. But the Air Force said 794 Thunders "committed destruction" of two power stations near Changin Reservoir and two on the Sonchong River in Eastern Korea.

Nearly 200 Navy planes from the East Coast joined Air Force planes from dozens of Korean bases to hit the shattered generating stations. Navy headquarters announced.

The U.S. Eighth Air Force reported increased pilot action along the 155-mile battlefront Tuesday. One Allied patrol battled for almost 40 minutes in a fierce dogfight over Chorum, the scene of bloody fighting during the past two weeks.

As Allied experts studied ground maps to evaluate destruction wrought by a big raid on North Korean power plants, there were strong hints that more Red targets are marked for attack.
