GOP Gets Stage for Using Variations of White Case

THE Eisenhower administration, using the Harry Dexter White case as a starter, can now go on again with a new twist: Why did the Truman administration let White go after getting FBI reports on them and then let them resign with power of recall or pardon?

The 1945 FBI report which named White as a suspect was given to Eisenhower, which was given to Eisenhower by Truman's former President Truman, to appear today.

The Senate's subcommittee on Internal Security, which yesterday heard Brownell and FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover, asked former Secretary of the Treasury, John W. Snyder, former President Truman, to appear today.

TO ANSWER QUESTIONS
Snyder told the committee he couldn't make it today but would answer later his questions about Harry Dexter White, who was assistant secretary of the Treasury when Truman gave him the job with the fund.

Truman claimed in his Monday night broadcast that he kept White on because there was a need for White's services in the White House. However, by his testimony before the committee yesterday, indicated that a decision was made by Truman, saying it was taken not with FBI review or approval but actually with FBI disapproval.

ONE OF THE worst evils of modern totalitarianism is the revival of the concept of blood guilt, the regime of terror, the Communist Russia if one member of a family is suspected of disloyalty to the regime.

Such a concept is, of course, a delusion. It is not in any sense a scientific theory, quickly learned in looking into the Radulovic case.
