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STATE CREDIT STILL IN GOOD SHAPE

LAST SUMMER, the State of North Carolina sold 14 1/4 million dollars in bonds for work at state institutions. The

J. Carolina sold 14 1/4 million dollars in bonds for work at state institutions. The interest rate was 2.30 per cent.

In October, the people of the state approved a new 72 million dollar bond issue for schools and mental institutions. Prior to the election, state officials predicted that the interest rate would be somewhere between 2.35 and 2.50 per cent. It turns out that they were everly conservative. Either the gradual loosening of the minery market or the strengthening of the state's economic base has made N. C. bonds more attractive to investors. For this week, 31 million dollars of the

72 million dollar bond issue were sold to a syndicate headed by Chase National Bank of New York and Wachovia Bank & Trust Co. of Winston-Salem. The interest rate—2.03857 per cent.

The fact that North Carolina was able to borrow money for schools and mental institutions at a much lower interest than had been anticipated will mean a substan-tial saving to the taxpayers over the term of the bonds.

The result of the bond sale bears out Governor Umstead's expressed confidence in North Carolina's ability to pay for the services needed by its people.

Members of the Atlantic Union Committee meeting there took issue with the doctrine that apvereignty resides in government. "We hold," they said, "to the traditional American concept, enshrined in our constitution, that sovergignty re-sides in the American people, not in the government they created."
