Red Atrocity Charges Aided Before U. N.

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—The United States bitterly attacked the communist world in the United Nations today for fearful atrocities in Korea and for forcibly holding back World War II prisoners.

Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., chief U. S. delegate, prepared to back up the present setting strictly charges with the longest record in his career as head of the U. S. delegation.

The U. N. delegates met to discuss the 20,815 atrocities cases in Korea, the listing covered cases up to last June 30, including 6,113 American soldiers, more than 5,000 U. N. military personnel, and 12,504 Korean civilians.

S. C. Brief Defends School Segregation

WASHINGTON (AP)—South Carolina contended to the Supreme Court today that the Constitution's 14th amendment was not intended to end segregation of Negro and white pupils in public schools.

The amendment was adopted after the Civil War. It provides that no state may deny any person the equal protection of the laws, nor abridge the privileges and immunities of citizens.

The brief said that segregation cases attacking school segregation practices in Virginia, Delaware, Kansas, South Carolina and the District of Columbia.
