

Prison Separation Measure Defeated

RALEIGH (AP)—Legislation to reform the Prisons Department from control of the State Highway Commission was defeated in House Judiciary 2 Committee today by a 7-4 vote.

The bill was introduced by Rep. W. Umstead of Orange, brother of Gov. Umstead. However, it did not have the backing of the governor who has asked the Legislature to have a thorough study made of the separate problem.

Rep. Sam Worthington of Pitt, chairman of the committee, said he has his reservations about the bill. He said he has received letters from members of the League of Women Voters urging that separate approval.

REHABILITATION STRESSED The bill would have established a new state commission to administer the prisons. Sen. John Umstead said that it would place greater emphasis to be placed on rehabilitation of prisoners.

The committee approved a substitute measure to deal with problems presented by "hot rodents" and their speedy automatic release. Umstead has recommended a law banning hot rods from the highways.

The committee substitute would make it easier to convict hot rod drivers and to keep them in jail. It would also make it easier to get the ownership of a hot rod voided as prima facie evidence that the owner was driving it.

SEAT RE-ALLOCATION Rep. George Long of Alamance offered an amendment to the Constitution which would take the duty of re-allocating House seats in accordance with population from the state after each federal census.

The proposal followed action of the House Senatorial Districts Committee Tuesday night in killing bills providing for re-allocating House seats and a re-districting of the Senate.

DRIVERS' RESPONSIBILITY Rep. J. H. Hester of Wayne, sponsor of the measure, said the bill would put into law the theory that "the driver carries with it the responsibility to respond to damages."

He said the measure would require liability insurance coverage for 80 to 90 per cent of Tar Heel motorists within three years.

Police Chief D. V. Long said he would see that Frederick W. Pope, 27, of Danville, got his 10-year sentence in the Connecticut State Police Detective R. N. Stark finally broke Pope's story after three days of questioning.

REDS SAY DOUBLE LET AIR HELD CAPTIVE

TOKYO (AP)—Red China's Peiping Radio said early today that double jet ace Harold Fisher was shot down and captured in Manchuria. Fisher was flying a P-51 Mustang.

The radio quoted a dispatch from Mukden, Manchuria near the Yalu River, said Fisher bailed out of his Sabre jet.

Peiping said Fisher's plane was intercepted by anti-aircraft units and the "People's Air Force."

Capt. Fischer, 27, from Sweet City, Iowa, failed to return from a mission Tuesday.

The Red broadcast said that according to his statement, the captured pilot was held in a camp with other prisoners.

At that time, Dean was kept in a separate camp. Since then Dean's whereabouts have not been made known by the Communists.
