A HOUSE judiciary subcommittee has set a hearing next Tuesday on a resolution to impeach Justice Douglas for "high crimes and misdemeanors." The first act of the subcommittee, after hearing from Rep. Wheeler who introduced the resolution, should be to kill it quickly and decisively.
