75 More Americans Returned By Reds

PANMUNJON (U)—Seventy-five more Americans streamed back to freedom today as the great Korean War prisoners exchange entered its third week. Besides the Americans, the Reds turned back 73 British and 300 South Koreans—50 more than the 400 daily the Reds originally promised.

Again tomorrow, the Communists planned to step up deliveries. They said they returned 450 Allied captives—73 Americans, 15 British and 350 South Koreans. That is the largest single group returned.

Edw. J. Flynn, Ex-Democratic Chairman, Dies

DUBLIN (U)—Edward J. Flynn, American Democratic party leader who died here last night. The 81-year-old Democratic national committeeman and leader of the Bronx, New York, had been vacationing here. He died in a hospital.

Long in ill health he sailed from New York for Ireland on the Macretania, July 25. He went aboard the liner in a wheelchair. His wife and 17-year-old daughter Sheila sailed with him.

He succeeded Flynn as Democratic national chairman in 1940 and managed Roosevelt's successful third term bid.

Currently he was hitting his strength against the re-election bid of Mayor Vincent Impellitteri of New York City. Flynn and Tammany Hall leader Carmine de

CONFERENCES FOR AUSTRIAN PACT SLATED

Big Three Agree To Red Demands For Resumption

WASHINGTON (U)—The Big Three Western Powers have agreed to Russia's demand that work be resumed on comprehensive peace treaties with Austria—if the Soviets are willing to stick to the issues and finish the job. The agreement, which the Western nations have been pressing on this understanding.

The United States, in a note similar to ones dispatched from London and Paris, said it is willing to consider the abbreviated treaty which the Western nations have been pressing on this understanding.

The main point of difference between the two drafts is that the Western omits a clause calling for the return of industries which the Soviets are holding on the grounds that they belong to the German Nazi regime of Adolf Hitler.

Several Western powers said they believed the secret POWs will pour from camps in China. One prisoner estimated it holds 200 to 300 Americans captured in the early months of World War II.

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Peace As A Condition For Korea Conference

Five Neutrals, Six Combatants Suggested

U. S. Would Limit Talks To Fighters

NAMED IN TESTIMONY

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (U)—Russia proposed today that the Korean peace conference be made up of five so-called neutrals and six of the countries which fought in Korea. This challenged the U. S. concept of the conference.

The United States insists that the conference be limited to countries which actually fought in the conflict, with Russia a possible exception. The U. S. position is that Russia can take part in the Chinese Reds and North Koreans want them.

The Soviet proposal called for participation of the United States, Britain, France, Russia, Red China, India, Poland, Sweden, Burma, North Korea and South Korea.

Photographer Describes His Experiences As A Prisoner Of The Reds

NOEL—This is another in a series of stories by Frank Noel, the former FBI pilot, who was shot down in April 1951. He was a bridegroom of six days.
