# New Dealer Wins New York Mayor's Race

## Robert Wagner Jr. Defeats Impeller

NEW YORK (AP)—The New Dealer wing of the Democratic party in New York administered a stunning defeat to the conservative branch in securing a near clean sweep of city primary elections yesterday.

Wagner's candidates also won nomination in the two contests for other city-wide offices and in three of four contested races for nomination as borough president.

With returns totalled from 4,280 of the city's 4,392 election districts, Wagner led Impeller by 335,413 to 176,000.

The election represented a major triumph for such nationally known Democrats as Rep. Frank D. Roosevelt Jr., Sen. Herbert Lehman and Averell Harriman.

The outcome appeared to curb an attempted political comeback by former Democratic National Chairman James A. Farley.

# Grunewald Sent To Jail For Violation Of Parole

WASHINGTON (AP)—Henry W. (The Dutchman) Grunewald, erstwhile Washington wiretapper, was jailed today as parole violator.

The judge turned down a tearful plea by his wife that he be spared from imprisonment.

As an instance of parole violation, Garrett said Grunewald traveled from his summer home at Spring Lake, N. J., to Newark and registered in a hotel under an assumed name for two days and part of a third day.

"Another violation," Garrett said, "occurred in a Washington hotel in June when Grunewald 'in a drunken condition' was asked to leave."

# American Airliner Falls Near Albany

ALBANY, N. Y. (AP)—An American Airlines plane crashed, exploded and burned with a loss of 28 persons—all aboard—near the Albany airport today.

The Convair, en route from Boston to Chicago (flight 723), pitched into a small fire near the Albany, Schenectady highway about 2 1/2 miles from the airport.

The plane exploded and burned rapidly.

About a dozen passengers were thrown clear of the wreckage. The others were trapped in the flaming ship.

CAUSE UNKNOWN  
The cause of the crash was not determined immediately.

John W. Hodd, 23, an ex-military pilot who lived nearby, said he heard the engine cut out and then roar as if the pilot had "gummed it."

Hodd said that when he saw the crash he ran to the door of the plane and tried to open it but was driven back by the flames.

Another witness, Mrs. Alice France, who lived near the crash, said the plane seemed to explode. Then she said she saw a "shot of fire" that died immediately.

Lester Hansen, an oil truck driver, said he saw the plane circling low over the area. It backfired a couple of times and then came down fast at about a 45-degree angle.

JUST MISSES CAMP  
The Convair just missed the trailer camp.

The accident scene was about 6 miles east of Schenectady city line and eight miles west of Albany.

Inspector Joseph Sayres of the state police said he believed the 25 passengers, the pilot and co-pilot and the stewardess were killed outright.

Earlier, the plane had stopped at Bartley Field, near Hartford, Conn., en route from Boston to Chicago.

The plane struck and damaged slightly two 365-foot towers of Albany Radio Station WPTZ.

The air line office at Chicago listed the following as members of the crew:

1st Officer William J. Schanken, Chicago  
Stewardess Janice Thorquist, Duluth, Minn.

Another trailer camp resident, Mrs. Alberta Craig, said the plane hit the ground about 10 feet from her trailer.

She said all she saw was a burst of flame. The flames scorched her trailer, she said.

Ambulances, physicians and volunteers rushed to the scene. But there was not much to be done. All were dead.

## Storm Turning From Coast

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Hurricane Edna began curving northward in the open Atlantic today on a course away from all land areas and showed signs of spreading out and losing some strength.

An 11 a. m. (EST) advisory placed this tropical storm of the season about 600 miles east and a bit south of Miami and 435 miles east of Nassau, Bahamas.

An Air Force plane from Bermuda reported encountering winds slightly over 100 miles per hour on the northeast edge of the center. Gale force winds extended 200 miles in the eastern semicircle and about 75 miles to the west.
