Bricker Replies To Ike's Objections To Amendment

WASHINGTON (U-P)—Sen. Bricker (R-Ohio), ticking off the objections President Eisenhower has raised to his proposed constitutional amendment on treaty-making power, tabbed one after another as "untrue" and "100 per cent wrong" in a Senate speech today.
