Ike Sees Congress Fighting 'Cold War Of Politics' If Republicans Lose Grip

Don't 'Taut', Winnie Warns U.S. Isolation Danger Told

By TOM OCHILTREE BLACKPOOL, England.—Prime Minister Winston Churchill today warned the Western world, including Britain's left-wing Socialists, to avoid touting the United States into a policy of isolationism which he said would condemn all Europe to Russian conquest. The 79-year-old statesman, addressing the Conservative Party annual conference, pledged himself to work "while I have life and strength" for a system of peaceful co-existence with the Soviet Union based on Western strength and unity. His promise appeared to spike rumors that he intended soon to retire.

13 Missing After Fire

Rough Korean Days Recalled Last Man Of Tomahawks Back Home

By ED JOHNSON FORT LEWIS, Wash.—Weather-beaten M. Sgt. Arne Stenslie of Devil's Lake, N. D., is a humble man. He's Mr. Second Division in person—all five-foot-seven, 69 years of age. The Army sergeant is a veteran of 32 years' military service. He's the only one of thousands who sailed from here for Korea in mid-1950 with the gallant 2nd Infantry Division and who returned with the same outfit Thursday. Many others spent their lives along the bloody Nakdong River line. They were cut down and burned alive at "Massacre Valley." They died in decisive battles like the one at Chip Yong Ni. Or they fought their hearts out on Heartbreak Ridge. Some returned to their loved ones. They were rotated home before it was too late. But of Stenslie—seriously wounded and hurt in battle several other times—stayed on.

The sergeant didn't want to talk about it much. "Oh, I was wounded pretty bad once," he said in an interview here yesterday. "I was shot in the face, and for about two minutes, I couldn't see. I thought I was blind." RUBBED HIS EYES "I stood on my feet for two minutes, silently praying that another bullet would come along and end it all. I started to rub my eyes. Suddenly I saw the flash of enemy mortar rounds going off. "When I realized that I wasn't blind, it was the happiest moment in my life." Truth is, Stenslie wouldn't even have been there if he hadn't given up his captain's commission when he reached officer's compulsory retirement age of 60. "That was when he had to quit—or re-enlist as a non-commissioned soldier."

Premier Sees Approval Of West Defense Mendes-France Asks German Arms Okay

By CARL HARTMAN PARIS.—Premier Pierre Mendes-France predicted today the National Assembly will put its final approval within 60 days on the London decisions to rearm West Germany, but only after "a hard fight." Mendes-France made the statement in an interview with Malcolm Forbes, a Republican state senator from New Jersey who is also editor and publisher of Forbes Magazine, Business. The Premier has already asked that the Assembly give him a vote of confidence on Tuesday which would approve in general the decisions taken at the nine-nation London conference. Mendes-France wants backing for the additional agreements yet to be negotiated before the Assembly will be asked to ratify the London decisions in their final form. It is this action he says will come about 60 days hence.

16 Fliers Lost In Shooting In July 1953

WASHINGTON.—The United States today accused Russia of having "wittingly and knowingly" lied about the shooting down of an American B50 bomber over the Sea of Japan in July, 1953. It filed a formal damage claim for \$2,785,492.94. At the same time the United States challenged Russia—if the Communists deny liabilities for the damages—to join in taking the dispute to the International Court of Justice. Ambassador Charles E. Bohlen delivered the 17-page American note to the Soviet Foreign Office in Moscow today. In Washington, the State Department made the note public and announced that U.S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge Jr. has been instructed to circulate the text among the members of the U.N. Security Council.

5 Picked Up From Capsized Freighter

NORFOLK, Va.—The Coast Guard reported today that five men had been picked up and "many survivors" from the missing off-shore freighter Mormackie had been sighted in the water about 150 miles east southeast of Cape Henry, Va. One of the men picked up by the Greek freighter Macedonia, Michael Angel Hernandez, chief steward of the Mormackie, said the 6,000-ton freighter had capsized.

Crazed Man Kills Three

NEW YORK.—A crazed male boarder in a Harlem apartment, claiming "I was going to kill," yesterday beat to death a 4-year-old child, her grandmother, and a 14-year-old girl. The alleged killer, Benito Rivera Mandonados, 31, swung a baseball bat on police as they closed in on him and shouted: "Come and get me. I did it." Dollar bills were found in the clothes of each of the victims and police said the slayer put them there "to warn off evil spirits." Slain in the savage assault, during which a small television set and several chairs were smashed to bits, were the child, Doris Rodriguez, Mrs. Sotera Torres, about 40, and four-year-old Ruth Lopez, a visitor to the four-room, fifth floor flat. Rivera Mandonados, employed at a nickel plating firm, told police he had his morning coffee at the apartment and, on the way to work, discovered he was spitting blood. This convinced him, he was quoted as saying, that he had been poisoned. Also, police said, the man contended his victims had tried to make him "marry" the family dog.

Hazel Growing In Intensity

MIAMI, Fla.—The 125-mile-per-hour winds in the tropical Caribbean Sea today still on a west northwest course that posed no immediate threat to land. Navy hurricane hunter planes were not penetrating the great disturbance because of its violence. They were warned away from it after a crewman of a plane was injured. The San Juan, P. R., Weather Bureau called Hazel "very dangerous." It was expected to continue on its west northwest course in the open Caribbean Sea today. The present course would take it south of Jamaica. Early today the eighth hurricane of the season was about 850 miles south southeast of Miami. It was moving at a forward rate of about eight mph. The advisory said, "swins of 125 miles per hour are occurring within 75 miles of the center in the northern semicircle and within 30 miles in the southern semicircle. Gale winds extend out about 200 miles to the north and 100 miles to the south."

Signs Statement Of Confession 'Good' Boy Held In Double Killing

SPRINGFIELD, Mass.—"The boy around the corner" was arrested yesterday in connection with the savage two-week-old knife slaying of pretty baby sister Lynn Ann Smith, 14, and her four-year-old charge. Police Chief Raymond P. Gallagher said Kenneth R. Chapin, 15, a high school sophomore, was a pallbearer at the girl's funeral, admitted in a signed statement he opened the door admitting him to the Goldberg apartment in a substantial section of Springfield. Then, Gallagher went on, the young man heard little Stephen cry. He went to the child's bed and stabbed him and beat him with the wooden chair. "I offered no reason for the double slaying." Dist. Atty. Stephen A. Moryahan said young Chapin will be arraigned today on a charge of murder. Gallagher said the youth, a school leader who had never before been in trouble with the police, chain-smoked cigarettes but otherwise was calm as he explained the slaying and readily signed his statement.
