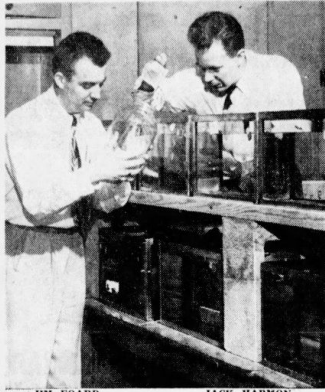

# McCarthy Officially Condemned By Senate

any basis to reports he might break away from the Republican party to form a new party, replied "there's nothing to it."

"I am a Republican and intend to remain a Republican," he said. "And I will do my work within the Republican party because that's the best place."

The Republican leadership in the Senate divided on the resolution of condemnation. Voting against it were Sens. Knowland (Calif.), the majority leader, Bridgeman (N.H.), the temporary president of the Senate, and Millican (Colo.), chairman of the conference of all Republican senators. Voting for it were Sens. Ferguson (Mich.), chairman of the Senate Republican Policy Committee, and Saltonstall (Mass.), the assistant GOP floor leader.

Knowland said he regarded the issue as a matter to be determined by each senator on the basis of his own convictions, rather than as a party question. A similar view was expressed throughout by the Democratic leader, Sen. Lyndon Johnson of Texas.

President Eisenhower declined comment on the Senate's action at his news conference yesterday. He said it was a matter of the Senate determining what is required in preserving its dignity. No one else is in it, he said.

The resolution, as adopted by the Senate in its final form, condemned McCarthy's conduct on these two counts:

1. That he had obstructed the constitutional processes of the Senate by failing to cooperate with and by repeatedly abusing a Senate elections subcommittee and its members in their investigation of his financial affairs in 1952.

2. That he "acted contrary to senatorial ethics and tended to bring the Senate into dishonor and discredit" by his attacks on the special committee that recommended his censure and by calling the Senate to a special session, among other things, "a lynch party."

**SUBSTITUTE COUNT**  
The second count, offered by Bennett, was adopted in place of a count recommended by the special committee to condemn McCarthy for "intemperate abuse" of Brig. Gen. Ralph W. Zwicker. The count based on McCarthy's treatment of Zwicker at a desecration hearing in New York City last Feb. 18 was never brought to a vote after strong opposition to it became evident in the debate.

Bennett's count was substituted in place of a 64-23 vote, and then approved 64-24.

Sen. Flinders (R-Vt.), author of the original censure resolution against McCarthy, said after the final roll call that "this has been a long and sad, but very necessary experience." He said he believes that from now on "it will be possible to have a more constructive approach to fighting communism."

Sen. Watkins, chairman of the special committee, said "the Senate has just finished a very unpleasant task.

McCarthy, who had predicted in advance there would be "a completely one-sided" vote against him, said he was happy to get it over with so he could "get back to the job of digging Communists out of the government." He has scheduled an inquiry beginning next week on Reds in defense plants.

**NOT 'LYNCHED'**  
Reminded of his earlier characterization of the session as a "lynch party," McCarthy was asked if he felt like he had been lynched.

"No," he replied smilingly. "But I am disappointed with my Democratic colleagues. The Democrats went down the line in voting for censure although they said it would be a judicial proceeding."

But he said he has "no personal feeling against anyone who voted 'present' on the final roll call.

McCarthy referred to the Senate's action as "censure" more than once in talking to newsmen, despite some controversy in the Senate itself as to whether he had been censured.

Bridges raised the question after the vote, to the accompaniment of broad smiles from the McCarthy backers. He asked Vice President Nixon if the word censure appeared in the resolution that had been adopted.

Nixon told him it did not and said that without objection the title of the resolution would be accordingly amended to delete the word censure. The final title thus read: "A resolution relating to the conduct of the senator from Wisconsin, Mr. McCarthy."

However, Nixon declined to pass on whether the resolution censured McCarthy. He said senators could place their own interpretation on it.

Watkins said he considered "condemnation" an even stronger word. So did Sen. Stennis (D-Miss.), another member of the special committee.
