The Indochina phase of the conference was in recess until tomorrow, when it will take up a Communist demand that Communist-led Vietnamese forces get out of Laos and Cambodia.

Western sources said Communist reaction to these demands on Laos and Cambodia would determine whether the Indochina talks will continue.

British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden made this clear at a secret session yesterday. He told the nine-party meeting that the Indochina conference had made but one solid achievement in its seven weeks of deliberation—the start of military discussions between representatives of the French Union and the Communist-led Vietnamese.

Eden was understood to have added that if the parties fails to make progress tomorrow on the problem of Laos and Cambodia, he was not sure it would be worthwhile to continue debate.

He suggested that a wise course might be to suspend discussion until the military commission finishes its work of drawing cease-fire lines. Informed quarters said the Briton was not thinking of an overnight recess, but of a considerable interval.

This was regarded as particularly significant since Eden in the earlier stages of the conference had been the most patient of the Western leaders.

The Communists previously have refused to treat Laos and Cambodia separately from Viet Nam, contending that the fighting in all three states stems from nationalist movements. France and her allies contend that Vietnamese forces from Viet Nam invaded the two neighboring kingdoms.

Carr Thinks Army Tactics 'Improper'

Says Stevens, Adams Tried To Stop Probe

WASHINGTON (AP)—Francis P. Carr testified today he thinks Secretary of the Army Stevens and Army Counselor John G. Adams tried to stop a probe into the use of "improper" tactics against the Chinese Communist investigation of Reds in the Army... Carr, staff director of the McCarthy investigations subcommittee, expressed that opinion under questioning by Sen. McClellan (D-Ark)... Carr declined, however, to appraise whether the conduct of the Army officials could be described as "contrary to the security of our country."

He said Adams told him "there was no need for any hearings... The Republican majority of the hearings subcommittee is aiming for a wind up of the hearings on Friday, but continued feuding between Sen. McCarthy and Sen. Symington (D-Mo.) could delay that."

McCarthy and Symington have tangled repeatedly during the hearings. They feuded anew yesterday when McCarthy accused Symington of a "smear" against his aides and Symington retorting that secret information in McCarthy's files has been handled laxly with respect to security regulations—dangerously, Symington put it.

British Premier Due In Ten Days

WASHINGTON (AP)—Britain's Prime Minister Churchill will meet President Eisenhower here in ten days, and Secretary of State Dulles said today he hopes the informal talks will lead to closer understanding on collective defense of southeast Asia against Communism.

Dulles, who will take part in the conference, along with British Foreign Secretary Eden, indicated at a news conference that alternative to a European Defense Community will be considered along with the Southeast Asia situation... The European army issue is a critical one at the moment because of the French government crisis and the American desire for French approval of a collective defense setup.

Dulles made it clear that France will not be represented at the meeting but said that decisions will be made anyway. He said it is not unusual for the President to meet separately with either British or French officials... Dulles met newsmen for his weekly conference a few minutes after the White House had issued a brief announcement that Churchill and Eden will visit the President over the weekend of Friday, June 23.

Presidential Press Secretary James C. Hagerty, announcing the forthcoming visit, told reporters there will be "an informal meeting between the President and his two old friends" without any formal agenda... "Many things, a lot of things will be discussed," Hagerty said. The meeting comes at a time when Great Britain and the United States, powerful allies in World War II, no longer see eye to eye in various aspects of foreign policy and the effort to check communism.

Red China May Free Some U.S. Prisoners

GENEVA (AP)—Red China today told the United States that China will consider the "early release" of American military and civilian prisoners who have records of good behavior.

This was announced by the United States after a third meeting between U.S. and Chinese Communist representatives in Geneva. 83 American civilians and military personnel are either in prison or have been unable to get visas to leave China mainland... The Chinese told U. Alexis Johnson, U. S. ambassador to Czechoslovakia that those prisoners are there because of offenses committed in violation of Chinese law, but that the Peiping regime will review their behavior to see whether it warrants commutation of sentences or release.

McCarthy Asks For 'Facts'

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. McCarthy demanded today that the American people be given all the facts about the conduct of the Korean War, about loyalty claims against "clearing Communists" and about what McCarthy called a "traitorous order" by the Truman administration on Formosa... McCarthy delivered a speech on these subjects during one of his 10-minute questioning periods against Army-McCarthy hearings.

McCarthy said the board sent Communists "back to positions where they could keep a razor blade poised over the jugular vein of the nation"... As for Korea, McCarthy retorted the dismissal of Gen. Douglas MacArthur by President Truman and quoted Maj. Gen. Frank E.
