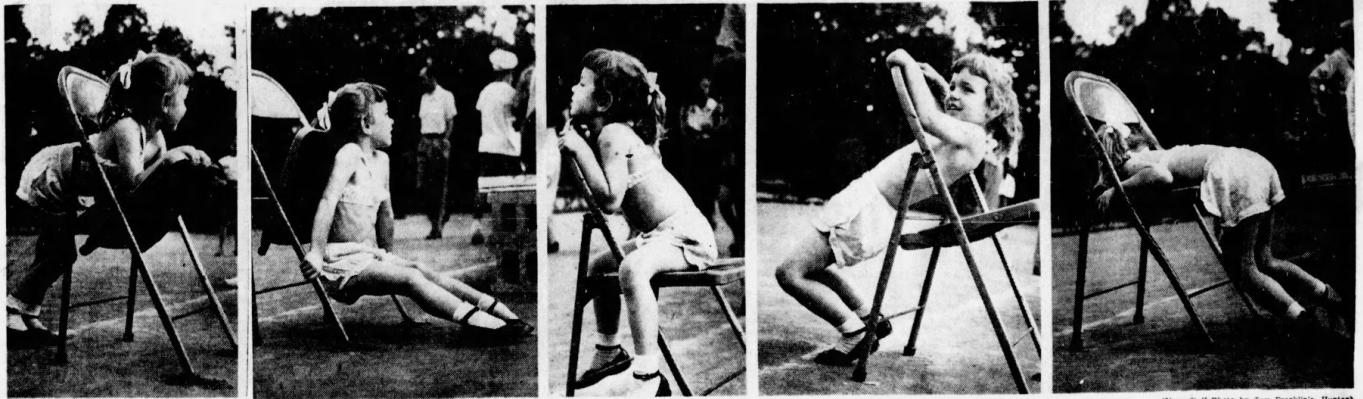

Governors Would See Ike

BOLTON LANDING, N.Y. (AP)—The President's proposal was interpreted by Fine, a Republican among leaders of the 46th annual vana proposed and Gov. Goodwin support of the administration. Eisenhower endorsed as placing a "cloud" on the states' control of road building activities challenge to them in the future. Expansion Needed

Almost without exception, Republican and Democratic governors agreed that the country needs a 10-year expansion of roads that would shape up as one of the country's greatest permanent, nonwar construction programs.

Arsenal Hinted In 3 Fires At High Point

Dulles Sees Hope For 'Just Peace'

PARIS (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles arrived here today and said he considers that a collective defense organization for Southeast Asia could help France get "just and honorable peace terms" in Indochina.

Dulles flew into Paris aboard a U.S. Military Air Transport Command plane for a British-French attempt to convince him an "honorable" peace can still be won in Indochina—and that his presence in Geneva would help win it.

82nd Flexes Muscles For Top Officials

FORT BRAGG (AP)—The nation's newest atomic artillery weapons were paraded here today before top defense officials.

Army Secretary Stevens, Defense Secretary Robert B. Anderson and Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, Army chief of staff, watched a mammoth parade and review of the crack 82nd Airborne Division and units of the 10th Corps Artillery, featuring the 230-millimeter atomic cannon and the "Honest John" altm rocket.

The defense officials termed the review "a very impressive sight indeed." It was the first time the atomic weapons had been displayed in a public review.

Later the visitors witnessed the first unrestricted firing of the "Honest John" rocket, a 783-mile-per-gun with a range of over 200 miles.

The chief of staff said the review showed the vast progress made in airborne warfare. In contrast to today's display of fire versatility, he said, airborne units of a few years ago were armed with 75 millimeter pack howitzers.

Ridgway said it was important for the public to realize the time lag between the drawing board and the training field for new weapons—and if they aren't ready when they are needed, it's too late," he said.

He added that the new weapons "are valueless except in the hands of men determined to fight and trained to do so."

The chief of staff said the 82nd Airborne is one of three divisions now at full strength. The other two are the 1st Airborne at Ft. Leavenworth, Wash., and the 44th Infantry at Camp Hood, Tex.

After the review, the defense officials toured the base observing basic paratroop training, parachute packing and other camp activities.

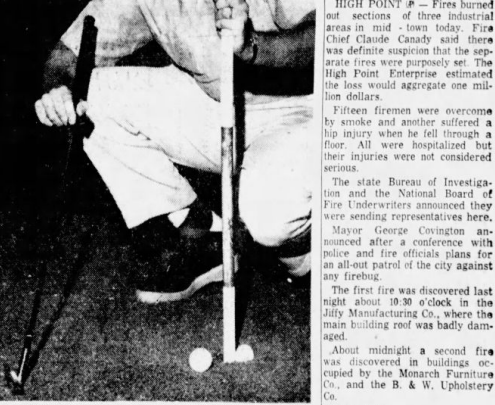
They were accompanied by Maj. Gen. Joseph P. Cleland, commander of Ft. Bragg, Lt. Gen. A. R. Bolling, 2nd Army commander, Maj. Gen. James M. Gavin, wartime commander of the 82nd and new head of the Army's G-3 section, and other officers.

Defense Secretary Wilson canceled plans to attend to fly to Detroit and the funeral of a former associate.

Only rarely is a full Army division assembled for a formal review, an occasion which takes weeks of planning and days of equipment polishing. It takes hours just to parade almost 18,000 men, their trucks, jeeps, weapons carriers, tanks and guns past a reviewing point.

Industrial Areas Hit By Blazes

FIREMEN INJURED; Damage Figure High



HIGH POINT (AP)—Fires burned out sections of three industrial areas in mid-town today. Fire Chief Claude Canady said there was definite suspicion that the separate fires were purposely set. The High Point Enterprise estimated the loss would aggregate one million dollars.

Fifteen firemen were overcome by smoke and another suffered a hip injury when he fell through a floor. All were hospitalized but their injuries were not considered serious.

The state Bureau of Investigation and the National Board of Fire Underwriters announced they were sending representatives here.

Mayer George Covington announced after a conference with police and fire officials plans for an all-out patrol of the city against any firebomb.

The first fire was discovered last night about 10:30 o'clock in the Jilly Manufacturing Co., where the main building roof was badly damaged.

About midnight a second fire was discovered in buildings occupied by the Monarch Furniture Co., and the B. & W. Upholstery Co.

THIRD FIRE

While firemen from High Point and six other cities and towns were battling the first two outbreaks, a third fire lit up the skies in an area two blocks from the heart of town as buildings of the Snow Lumber Co. caught flame. That block, sided by Hamilton, Wren, Commerce and Green Sts., was about half burned out. The Snow company's main shop was saved by a fortunate wind-shift about 4:30 a. m. Several other buildings and stacks of lumber were destroyed. The City Hall, which occupies a corner of that block, was not damaged.

Chief Canady said the fires were separated in such a manner that sparks from one could not have caused the others. The first broke out in an area about eight blocks west of the location of the second and third.

The fires had no effect upon the High Point Summer Furniture and Rug Show which opened in the Exposition Building yesterday.

Smoke which rose 1,000 feet, was visible for miles. A pall stretched north and east of the city for a distance of 25 miles.

High Point firemen were assisted by men and equipment from Winston-Salem, Greensboro, Thomasville and other cities.

Other fights were reported just north of Hung Yen, 25 miles south east of Hanoi, and through the Sept. Pagodes-Lac Son-Puh Lang Thong triangle, 35 miles northeast of Hanoi.

North of Hung Yen, rebel guerrilla and French-Vietnamese patrols clashed in small night battles for possession of the supply road from Hanoi.

In each fight, the French spokesmen said, the Vietminh were driven off before their demoralized units could cut the road. Twenty rebels were killed and 10 captured in the area.
