## Ike Says Air Attacks Part Of Reds' Plan

### President Sees Effort To Split Western Allies

Asserts U. S. Will Defend Its Rights

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower said today the Chinese Communist attacks of American and British planes are part of the Red plan to split the Western Allies. He declared the United States means to defend its rights. The President told a news conference the American rescue planes which were attacked by the Chinese Communists were engaged in legitimate business.

### Senate Filibuster Ends Atomic Compromise Sought

WASHINGTON (AP)—Controversy over the bill designed to carry out President Eisenhower's atomic program shifted today behind closed doors after a marathon debate in the Senate finally ended last night with 57-25 passage.

A Senate-House conference committee now must adjust basic differences in separate versions of a big bill to open the atomic power field to private industry and to authorize the release of limited nuclear information to U. S. allies.

Senate passage came at 9:47 p.m. last night, at the end of 13 days and nearly 169 hours of arduous debate. The bill was supported by 44 Republicans and 13 Democrats and opposed by 22 Republicans, 25 Democrats and independent Sen. Morse of Oregon.

### Girl Admits Intimacies With Cleveland Doctor

CLEVELAND (AP)—County Prosecutor Frank T. Cullinan today said pretty Susan Hayes had told authorities she had been intimate with Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard.

Her signed statement, the prosecutor said, disputed testimony given at an inquest last week by the 30-year-old osteopath Dr. Sheppard said their relationship was only casual.

The prosecutor quoted the 24-year-old hospital technician as saying in her statement that she had been intimate with the physician when he made a trip to California last spring and on other occasions also.

### House Passes Foreign Aid Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House formally passed and sent to the Senate today a bill appropriating \$3,208,419,579 to finance the foreign aid program for the present fiscal year.

The 266-128 roll call vote ratified tentative approval given the bill yesterday. Today it drew most of its support from Democrats, with 124 Democrats, 121 Republicans and 1 independent voting for it. Against it were 83 Republicans and 43 Democrats.

It is total is \$12,213,354 less than President Eisenhower requested, but his House leaders, with Democratic support, heart back efforts to trim it further.
