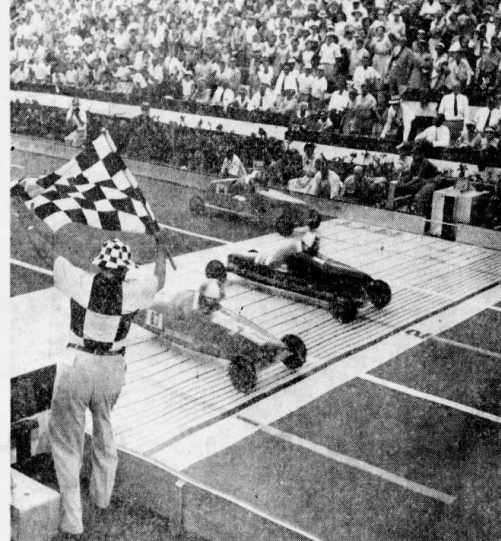
### House Action Would Outlaw Party Itself

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congressional leaders agreed at a White House conference today to try to push through Congress a new bill to outlaw the Communist party as such. In a session with President Eisenhower, the decision was to get the House to pass a measure declaring the Communist party is unlawful and without any rights. It would not make membership in the party by individuals unlawful. But Speaker Martin (R-Miss.) and Sen. Ferguson (R-Mich.) said the government already can go after individual Communists, and is doing so under the Smith Act, which makes it illegal to conspire to overthrow the government. The new approach is intended to supplant a bill that whipped through the Senate last week which would make it a crime to belong to the Communist party provided a person committed an overt act while a party member.
