

Connally Still Supports JFK Despite Civil Rights Split

Gov. John Connally expects to give his continued support to the Kennedy administration despite his disagreement with the public accommodation portion of the President's proposed civil rights program.

Connally made his remarks before a panel of newsmen Friday night at the Press Club of Fort Worth.

The governor said he believes Kennedy's civil rights position has hurt the Chief Executive in Texas, although he discounted the effects of the civil rights issue on the 1964 election.

Connally would not guess how many Texans are dissatisfied with Kennedy's stand. He said he does not believe liberal voters are the only ones national Democratic candidates will receive in Texas.

During the press conference, Connally said he is not considering a special legislative session at this time for congressional redistricting, pointing out that a hearing on a Republican suit for redistricting is scheduled within 10 days in federal court.

Defended Navy Secretary Fred Korth, his successor in the cabinet post, who is under fire by a Senate subcommittee investigating the TXF contract.

Assaulted again by County Commissioner Albert Pena, accusing the Texas Antonio man—who he charges, wants to be a political boss—of using Latin-American voters as "tools."

In introductory remarks, Connally outlined achievements of his administration in education, industrialization and tourism.

Committees Meet

New Solution Sought To Freeway Problem

A new solution to the East Side freeway problem, leaving out past history, is under consideration, Dr. R. H. W. Drechsel Sr., chairman of a committee representing the Texas Turnpike Authority, said Friday.

The committee agreed Friday to consult authority engineers to determine if some fresh approach can be devised.

Dr. Drechsel's group met with a committee representing Fort Worth, headed by Jack Butler, editor of the Star-Telegram.

The city has offered the turnpike authority \$22,000 for access to the western end of the Dallas-Fort Worth Turnpike. Use of a one-way turnpike section is needed as a tie-in for a proposed East Side service road.

Among those attending the meeting Friday were Clyde Ashworth of Arlington, chairman of the turnpike authority; Jack Davis, turnpike engineer; and Charles Parnell, attorney for the authority. Fort Worth Mayor Pro Tem Willard Barr, Councilman Doyle Willis, City Manager J. L. Brownlee and City Engineer M. W. Amis.

Funeral arrangements for Gus Cranz Jr., 55, of 212 N. Rivercrest Dr., who retired in 1959 as president of the Terminal Grain Company, will be announced by Robertson Mueller-Harper Funeral Home.

Cranz died Friday night in a hospital.

A Fort Worth native, he also was former president of the Fort Worth Grain and Cotton Exchange and the Tarrant County Historical Society.

Survivors include his wife, two sons, John F. Cranz of Fort Worth and G. E. Cranz Jr. of Houston; mother, Mrs. G. E. Cranz Sr.; and brother, P. Cranz, both of Fort Worth.

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Hoffa Dares Opponents To File Suit

CHICAGO, Sept. 14 (AP)—Teamster President James R. Hoffa says the FBI and the Justice Department "are not a boy to drag me into any court and let me prove it."

The outspoken Teamsters boss told union officials from 12 mid-west states: "I defy them to drag me into any court and let me prove it."

Hoffa also described Attorney General Robert Kennedy as a "fascist minded" and urged union members to support a political program of labor legislation.

The Kennedy administration, Hoffa said, is "hoping to appease you through inflation to get through 1964. No government department has planned beyond 1964."

Hoffa, who was re-elected chairman of the conference's policy committee, said the Teamsters Union is ready to negotiate a nationwide contract with the meat freight industry in 1964.

Long-Term State Lease Ruled Out

Star-Telegram Austin Bureau AUSTIN, Sept. 14—Attorney General Waggoner Carr ruled Friday that four state agencies could not negotiate a long-term lease on an El Paso building to serve as a central office center.

Carr said a section of a new state law permitting a 20-year lease on the El Paso structure was in violation of the Texas Constitution.

The House-originated bill authorized the Department of Public Safety, the Liquor Control Board, the Parks and Wildlife Commission and the comptroller's office to join in leasing the building.

The building would serve as a regional office for the four agencies, serving the far West Texas area.

Under terms of the bill, the lease would extend for 20 years with an option to purchase the building at the end of that time. The sale price was \$10.

In his opinion to Comptroller Robert S. Calvert, the attorney general said the Constitution prohibits any lease by the state that could not be paid off in current appropriations.

This means that a lease could not be for longer than two years, the duration of the state's biennial appropriations bill.

Fast Texas Tour by Kennedy Asked by Democratic Leaders

A quick political whirl through Texas by President Kennedy, probably in November, is the hope of Texas Democratic leaders.

Byron Skelton of Temple, Democratic national committee man, said Friday he and others had been working several months to bring the President to Texas.

"We are now hopeful it will be soon, within the next 60 days," Skelton said.

Fort Worth would be one stopping place during the one-day visit, Dallas, San Antonio and Houston are the other cities in the suggested itinerary.

Skelton said no definite date has been set, that the decision now is in Kennedy's hands.

The Democratic official said the President, if he visits the state, would appear at one or more fund-raising events for the Democratic National Committee.

Skelton said Texas leaders favor a tour in which people would get a chance to meet and talk to Kennedy.

Andrew Hatcher, assistant White House press aide, contacted by the Star-Telegram in Newport, R. I., with the President, would neither confirm nor deny plans for the tour.

What the weather or atmosphere is like outside at any time is "weather." Weather may be any combination of different amount of heat, moisture and motion in the air.

The modern system of weather forecasting begins by collecting reports from the weather stations all over the world. These reports contain information on the temperature, atmospheric pressure, humidity, wind, clouds and many other items observed at each reporting station.

All these reports are sent to central locations where the weather forecast is prepared.

The forecasters draw in "isobars," which are lines of equal atmospheric pressure. These lines outline the low pressure and high pressure areas. Rain or snow is often found in areas marked "low," while fair weather is likely in areas marked "high."

The forecasters know that a high-pressure area moving over a region will bring fair weather, while a low-pressure area, or a strong front, will bring stormy conditions. Of course this is only a rough outline of weather forecasting, with many details and facts left out, but it gives you an idea of how it's done.

BOSTON, Sept. 14 (AP)—Joseph P. Kennedy, father of the President, is scheduled to undergo surgery Saturday at New England Baptist Hospital.

The operation, which will keep him in the hospital for the day only, was described as removal of a "skin lesion."

Dr. Samuel F. Marshall, the operating physician, said the surgery is "minor procedure."

He said Kennedy, who was 75 on Sept. 6, would be able to return to his summer home in Hyannis Port later the day.
