

James Dean, Rising Young Movie Star, Is Killed in Crash

Actor Played Lead In John Steinbeck's 'East Of Eden'

PASO ROBLES, Calif., Sept. 30 (UP)—James Dean, rising young film star, was killed early tonight in a head-on collision 30 miles east of here.

Dean, racing car enthusiast, was killed instantly when his German-built Porsche sports car collided with an unidentified vehicle at a highway intersection near Cholame, hospital authorities said.

Dean and his secretary, a mechanic, identified as Ralph Wuerker, were on their way to ride races in Salinas, Calif. They were taken by ambulance to Paso Robles War Memorial Hospital.

An attending physician said Dean died instantly at about 5:30 p.m. He said the actor suffered a broken neck, numerous bruised bones, lacerations over the entire body and was "terribly battered" by the impact of the crash.

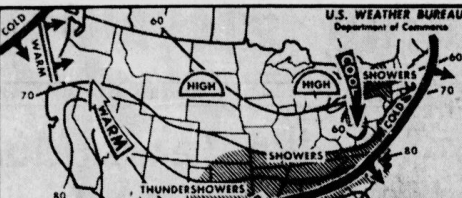
The hospital authorities said the mechanic was expected to survive but was in "moderately serious condition." He suffered a fractured jaw and fractured hip. In addition to body lacerations.

The California Highway Patrol said officers had completed investigation of the accident but reported it occurred at the intersection of Highway 41 and 462 at the small rural town of Cholame.

Dean shot to film prominence while leading a band of young men known as the "Beach Boys" in John Steinbeck's 'East of Eden.'

First reports of the young star's death were received by the press at the couple's Hollywood home from a still photographer accompanying Dean in another car.

Dean had been working for several months on the as yet uncompleted "Giant," film version of Edna Ferber's book about Texas.

'Indigestion' Report On Ike Said Given To Avoid Confusion

Snyder Declares Excitement Could Have Caused Shock

DENVER, Sept. 30 (AP)—An announcement that President Eisenhower was suffering from indigestion was made last Saturday, his physician said today. Several persons around the chief executive from becoming excited and thereby causing possible shock to the President.

Maj. Gen. Howard M. Snyder made the statement to newsmen when asked about reports of the President's ailment.

He said he believed, within three minutes after he arrived at the home of Mr. John S. Doud, where the President was staying, that Eisenhower had suffered a heart attack.

The method he used in making the announcement, the general said, was to avoid present confusion around the President.

The first announcement that the President had a "digestive upset" was given to reporters shortly before 8 a.m. Saturday. It was shortly after 2:30 p.m. when news was told that Eisenhower had suffered a heart attack.

Trapped 20 Hours In Cave-In, 2 Men Are Saved Unhurt

ELLY, Minn., Sept. 30 (AP)—Trapped 20 hours underground for 20 hours by an iron mine cave-in, two men were rescued tonight, unharmed.

They took right off for home under their own power after the lift brought 'em up," a spokesman at the mine head said.

Albert Marolt, 41, and Toyvo Hill, 35, were helped from the long-hole stope by a charge of obstructing a falling rock had blasted, chiseled and dug continuously since the men were imprisoned.

Rescue crews continued their efforts in a hunt for Joe Glinesk of Ely, a third miner caught when a steel pipe recurred forced into their hands through the shaft pulled down.

Workers toiling in mines pushed a shaft, large enough for a man's body, up to the men from a lower level, thus bypassing the collapsed shaft.

The rescued men, eager for reunion with their families, paused only long enough to orientate what they had shouldered earlier, when the air pipe—they had seen nothing since.

Officials of the Oliver Iron Mining Co. in whose Pioneer Mine the collapse came, said they were not sure when the cave-in occurred. Glinesk is found—or his body recovered.

U.S., Yugoslavia Seen Reaching Agreement

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, Sept. 30 (AP)—Informal talks between U.S. and Yugoslav government leaders ended today with full agreement on most problems.

The outstanding issues involved a controversy over Yugoslavia's refusal to permit U.S. military inspection of American arms delivered to this country and Yugoslavia's request for an additional \$40 million dollars in economic aid.

A communique on the talks is expected tomorrow.

Nixon Cancels Speech To Cautions Work

MIAMI, Sept. 30 (UP)—Vice President Richard Nixon today cancelled a speech scheduled for the American Legion convention beginning here Oct. 10 because of the press of extra duties in the wake of President Eisenhower's illness.

Legion officials said they will not attempt to get another speaker to fill the Oct. 13 vacancy left by Nixon's withdrawal.

Keynote speaker for the annual convention will be Secretary of State John Foster Dulles.

Hurricane Janet Dies In Sierra Madre Area

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 30 (UP)—Hurricane Janet passed into history tonight after tearing herself to pieces against the towering Sierra Madre mountains but the fearful monument of death and misery she built for herself continued to grow.

Janet's death toll in Mexico rose to 303 after another 36 bodies were reported found in the ruins left by her destructive power. In Chetumal, where she died, her husband, local authorities said they had recovered 30 more dead from beneath the wreckage, bringing the total for that city to 209.

They feared there would be "many more" as the cleanup continued.

H. B. Mitchell Dies

Normal Rule Seen During Ike's Rest Cabinet Stand May End New Powers For Nixon

Snyder Declares Excitement Could Have Caused Shock

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30 (UP)—President Eisenhower's Cabinet announced today after a lengthy review of foreign and domestic affairs that there are "no obstacles" to orderly conduct of the government until he gets well.

The responsible officers of the various government departments and agencies also pledged their "full cooperation" to the functions of the government will be carried forward in an effective manner during the absence of the President.

In addition, the statement issued by the White House on behalf of the Cabinet noted that presidential assistant Sherman Adams was setting up an office in Denver today so he later can "present any matters to the White House. In addition to regular Cabinet members, the association was attended by such other high officials as Budget Director Rowland H. Hughes.

After reports they were "greatly cheered" by the President's steady improvement, the Cabinet members said: "After full discussion of presidential matters, we concluded that there are no obstacles to the orderly and unimpeded conduct of the government and domestic affairs of the nation during the period of rest ordered by the President's physicians."

Telephonic Workers Reversing Board, Receive Penalties For Cutting Commissions

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Sept. 30 (AP)—Five men, accused of dynamiting cables during a recent telephone strike, drew penalties today in Criminal Court.

John D. McDermott, 28, was given two years in prison and a \$500 fine and placed on probation for five years.

McDermott was charged with conspiracy and with obstructing justice by his mother in a substitution way. He said the youth's association with his mother was "natural relationship of mother and son and not a sympathetic association with her political beliefs."

Mrs. Deborah Landy of Bradley Beach, N. J., the mother, had admitted to 10 years membership in the Communist party. She said she joined in 1947 at the urging of her son.

Last August, the Navy withheld the status of a reserve commission for which young Landy had worked at the academy at Kings Point, N. Y. He stood second in his graduation class in electrical engineering. He had won the award given by the Daughters of the American Revolution for attainments in naval science.

The Navy said then, and Thomas reported today, that he had no question of Landy's status, solely to the United States.

Landy, who has begun the study of law at Yale, said as New Haven, Conn. that "I'm very happy" and "now I can start on a normal life again."

Nikes To Be Tested From Virginia Base

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30 (AP)—The National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics said today it will fire Nike guided missiles from its Wallops Island, Va., testing range in the next two months.

A spokesman for the NACA said these will be the first Nike firings in the Eastern United States, except for an accidental firing at Ft. Meade, Md., last April. Previous Nike tests have been made at the Army's White Sands, N.M., firing ground.

U.S. Acts To Halt Arms From Czechs

George Allen, Native Of Durham, Meets Nasser Today

CAIRO, Saturday, Oct. 1 (AP)—A special American envoy, George Allen, meets Premier Gamal Abdel Nasser today in an effort to counter Egypt's announced intention of buying arms from the Communist bloc. But his mission met with anonymity in high Egyptian circles.

Members of Egypt's governing Revolutionary Council, privately expressed at press reports of the U. S. assistant secretary of state might threaten to cut off American economic aid to Egypt if she goes through with the deal to swap cotton and rice for Czechoslovak arms. Egyptian Nasser repeated this to mean Allen came to Egypt to serve an ultimatum.

Allen is a native of Durham, N.C.

Allen arrived yesterday. The British and French ambassadors planned to see Nasser today also to add their voices to the protest.

The Big Three in 1950 signed a declaration guaranteeing Middle East frontiers and pledging to maintain the Israeli-Arab balance of power. All three have criticized the Egyptian arms deal with Czechoslovakia as a move likely to upset that balance.

In Washington, as Allen left on his mission, sources said he was preparing to warn Egypt if she brought about a radical change in the power balance, the United States would be obliged to review its policy of economic cooperation with Cairo for economic development.

Informed quarters here said Allen might warn Nasser a scheme to purchase Egyptian purchases of American arms as a substitute for the Czech deal.

On his arrival here, Allen would not expand on the reasons for his visit except to say that "Much which has been printed about my mission has been incorrect." He said he came to Egypt to try to understand Egyptian policy and clarify American policy.

Charlotte Drivers Agree On Extension Of Work Contract

CHARLOTTE, Sept. 30 (AP)—Negotiating bus drivers and City Coach Lines of Charlotte today extended their working contract until Oct. 27, a Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service commissioner reported.

D. Yates Heafner said negotiations for a new contract would be renewed next week, looking toward an agreement before the extension expires.

Joe B. Pierce, who represents the drivers as head of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, said drivers are seeking an across the board raise of 30 cents an hour. Earlier, a City Coach spokesman said such an increase would amount to \$500,000 a year.

The drivers also are asking for double pay on holidays, an expansion of vacation policy and increased passes for families of the drivers.

The present contract, negotiated with Duke Power Co. which formerly operated the buses, expired July 1. It was extended to Sept. 19, and again until midnight tonight.

City Coach purchased the Charlotte franchise and equipment early this year. It also has purchased Duke bus systems in other Carolina cities.
