Presbyterians Hold Pee Dee Area Rallies

FLORENCE—Dr. Arthur M. Martin of Columbia, executive secretary of the S. C. Presbyterian Synod, will be one of three speakers at an area rally of the Pee Dee Presbytery, to be held tonight at 7:30 at the First Presbyterian Church here.

Dr. J. Cecil Lawrence of Charlotte, N. C. and Dr. I. Moultrie Bagnal of Bennettsville's First Presbyterian Church, will be the other principal speakers.

Dr. Lawrence will present benevolent causes of the General Assembly of the denomination, while Dr. Martin will present Synod causes and Dr. Bagnal, Presbytery causes.

Due to attend tonight's meeting are pastors and laymen of Darlington and Florence counties.

A similar rally was set for Monday night at Myrtle Beach for Horry and Marion counties, and one Wednesday night at Bennettsville for Chesterfield and Marlboro counties.

Last year, the 7,000 members in 40 churches of the Presbytery gave a total of \$125,325 to benevolent causes of the church, and a total of \$62,863 to all causes, including current expenses and building funds. Local churches are preparing their budgets for 1960, and the stewardship rallies now in progress are part of the emphasis given finances. Dedication Sunday comes Nov. 8, when Presbyterians are to express their financial interest in the various financial causes presented.

The Rev. J. Wilkespoon Dunlap of Darlington is chairman of the Stewardship Committee for the Presbytery and a leader in the three rallies.

Circus to Play At St. Andrews School Here

The circus is coming to Saint Andrews Community of Columbia. The circus will arrive Friday, Oct. 2. Performances will be at 3:15 and 8 o'clock under the big top located West of Saint Andrews School. The one-day attraction is being sponsored by the Saint Andrews Ruritan Club, members of which are conducting an advance sale of general admission tickets, club president John M. Pauling of Saint Andrews said.

The Beers-Barnes Circus of Hialeah, Fla., is a complete Circus with performing elephants, wirewalkers, aerialists, jugglers, and a score of trained animal acts including trained seals, bicycling chimps, liberty horse and pony drill acts, trained dogs, and monkeys.

Among the featured acts are two former Ringling Brothers circus stars, the Don Mauricio and Julie team of jugglers and Harold the ballet wirewalker.

The Circus big top has a seating capacity of approximately 1,500 persons. Parking for Circus patrons will be made available by Ruritans at the school grounds, a short walk from the showground site at the corner of Broad River Road and Rush River Road, Mr. Pauling said.

Hypnosis Rids Man of Hiccups

CHICAGO — A single hypnotic suggestion successfully cured an eight-day case of hiccups in a man recovering from a heart attack, two Philadelphia doctors have reported.

A serious complication of myocardial infarction, hiccups, produce extreme exhaustion in the patient if they are prolonged by Gordon Bendersky and Martin Baren said.

A 53-year-old man developed hiccups 22 days after he had suffered a heart attack. After eight days of almost constant hiccupping, during which all the standard treatment methods were tried, the patient was given one hypnotic suggestion that the hiccups would disappear.

"This proved to be successful. Except for two hiccups which occurred several hours later, the hiccups failed to return. The remainder of this convalescence was uneventful," the doctors wrote in the September Archives of Internal Medicine, published by the American Medical Association.

Guilford College Historic Oak Loses Battle

GREENSBORO, N. C. (AP)—The historic Revolutionary Oak at Guilford College fought its final battle Tuesday night—and lost.

The 45-year-old tree toppled into the New Garden Cemetery during high winds caused by the backwash of hurricane Grace.

In June, 1855, the age of the tree, which measured 30 feet in girth, was estimated at between 49 and 500 years. About 5 feet to the southeast of it lay the common grave of 13 American and British soldiers who died in the 1781 Battle of Guilford Courthouse. Tradition says that the first British soldier to die in that battle fell within sight of the tree.

Australia's Sheep Herds Increasing

CANBERRA — Australia's sheep population, in the year ended March 31, climbed by more than 3,000,000 to a total of 63,000,000. During the same period dairy cattle declined from nearly 5,000,000 head to slightly more than 4,800,000, and beef - cattle herds were cut from nearly 12,000,000 to 11,250,000.
