WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—The fight of President Armas of Panama, being regally entertained at the White House this week, must cause pains of anguish to Patrick J. Hurley, associate secretary of war.

Once before Armas was an acute event in the neck to Pat Hurley. WORK POLICE SWING CLUBS \$10,000 Verdict. Goes Against Ford

Philadelphia, Oct. 13.—A verdict of \$100,000 against Henry Ford was awarded today by a jury in the suits involving the Detroit factory and the Sweeten Automobile company of this city.

Ford sued the Sweeten Automobile company for \$6,800 admitted to be due on promissory notes, and the Sweeten concern brought a counter action to recover \$100,000 which it claimed it lost as a result of Ford taking over the Lincoln Motor company. The Sweeten company was the Philadelphia distributor for the Lincoln car at the time it is now in receivership.

The jury had been on trial since Monday, Judge Harry S. McDewitt presiding. The jury was asked to express an opinion in the case. The trial was held before a jury by agreement of counsel.

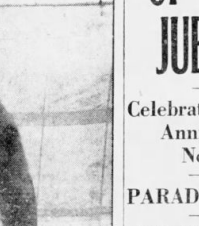
