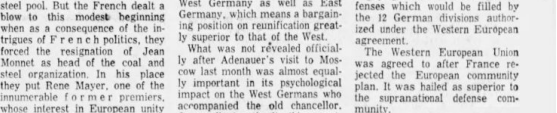

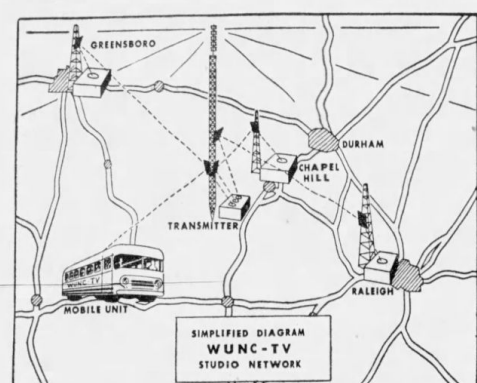

WUNC-TV Has Found Its Niche

WILL wind from Raleigh has blown a cool breeze over the role of WUNC-TV, the educational television station of the University of North Carolina.

Some commercial interests, including two radio stations and an insurance company, are apparently dickering to buy the station or enter into a time-sharing arrangement.

As the University's acting president, J. Harris Purks, was quick to point out, no such deal can be made under Federal Communications Commission regulations.

There are some disadvantages to educational television. There is no room for the give and take that distinguishes instruction in a classroom.

WUNC-TV wisely used, can show a housewife in Boone how to bake a better cake; it can teach tobacco cropping to a Pender County farmer and Shakespeare to a Charlotte businessman.

By the time of the 1956 General Assembly, it should have done its job well enough to qualify for greatly increased funds. It would be an unkind cut for North Carolina—one of the first states to operate an educational station—to lose that station to the Jackie Gleason cut just when it is coming of age.

SOME LANGUAGE DIFFERENCES

H L MENCKEN in his monumental "THE AMERICAN LANGUAGE and its supplements has done more than any other man to point up the fact that American, as distinguished from English, is a language and not a dialect.

Such were the differences that by the 20th century George Bernard Shaw joked that "England and America are two countries separated by the same language."

Mencken gives his native tongue the editorial pages of the BALTIMORE EVENING SUN in 1910, change seemed natural. The fourth (1936) edition of his AMERICAN LANGUAGE says: "As English spreads over the world, will it be able to maintain its present form? Probably not."
