Major Fight Near On Moroccan Border

RABAT, Morocco, Oct. 4.—(AP)—French troops battled rebel Moroccan tribesmen today in the fourth straight day of scattered violent clashes in Eastern and Northern Morocco.

The fighting was principally in the Rif Mountains between Taza and the Spanish Moroccan border, some 150 miles west of Rabat.

The tribal raids began a few hours after Sultan Mohammed Ben Moulay El-Abbas, 37, was overthrown from the French, left his palace in Rabat and fled to the international city of Tangier.

The French have charged that the new trouble was stirred up by rebels operating from the Spanish zone of Morocco.

Ford Will Lend \$70,000 In Cars To Safety Drive

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 4.—(INS)—The Ford Motor Co. announced today a highway safety program designed to help the nation's schools increase their driver-training activities.

The program, outlined at the 42nd annual conference of the International Association of Chiefs of Police, included a \$70,000 Ford car loan project.

Dealers plan to place more than 2,500 cars in the disposal of school authorities this year and increase this number in the year ahead, the police chiefs were told.

The program, which also includes a kit of safety educational materials, was the result of ideas presented by traffic safety experts in the Ford National Safety Forum in Dearborn, Mich., last month.
