



Britons Awaiting Billy's Coming



Wait Chapel, Wake Forest Campus Focal Point

LONDON (AP)—An evangelist Billy Graham touches off his second British crusade next month. There will very likely be the same problem as before—enough seats and standing space for people who want to see and hear him.

Graham, who preached in London for three months last year, drew a turnout of crowds consistently. He packed in more at Wembley Stadium than the 1948 Olympic games. The handsome 38-year-old native of Charlotte, N. C. became the first person to fill both Wembley and a White City stadium in a single day.

Graham's move "Back to God" effort this time will be in Glasgow, Scotland, beginning March 21. The arrangements committee is already wondering where it will put everybody.

Temporary seating to handle 10,000 persons is being erected in the exhibition auditorium of Glasgow's Kelvin Hall, where Graham will preach for three weeks. Closed circuit television will bring his face and words to the overflow in another section of the hall where there are 3,000 permanent seats.

WINDUP RALLY
For a windup rally, the crusade committee is thinking of taking over Hampden Park, Britain's largest stadium, which can hold 140,000.

Graham will carry his crusade to London from May 14-21. Then he will tour major cities in continental Europe.

When he arrived in Britain last February, some sections of the press were concerned over Graham's vigorous anti-communism, and there were predictions the staid British public would not warm to his "decision for Christ" appeals. But when his exhausted team packed up after a three-month campaign, Graham had talked to more than 1 1/2 million Britons.

Of that number, Graham gained some 36,000 converts. They were given cards and asked to hand them to a pastor of their choice. Recently there has been attempts to check on how well the conversions "stuck."

The Evening Standard said that it took a sample of 336 people who had come forward after Graham's sermons. A check with 20 pastors showed only about one-third of the 336 could be called converts, the newspaper said.

SOME STICK
The British Weekly, an inter-denominational paper, found from 1,500 pastors that they had

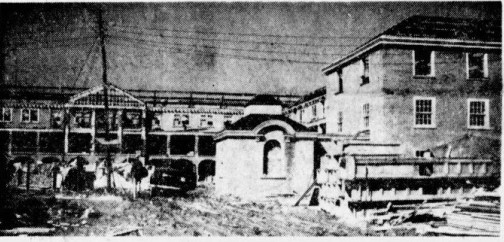
received 3,222 Billy Graham cards. Of these, 1,365 had been outside the church before hearing him, and about a year later 1,002, or 64 per cent, were still attending church services.

Applying its sample to the 36,000 converts, the British Weekly said 17,485 were outsiders or irregulars, and 11,516 were still attending church.

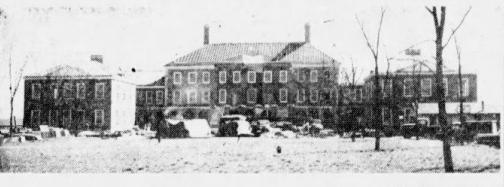
Graham's well-organized counseling and follow-up unit says its checks with pastors showed 26,500 persons, or about 73 per cent, handed over their cards. Up to six months after the crusade, 86 per cent were reported still active in church.

This Is The New Wake Forest

WINSTON-SALEM — Like mushrooms springing from a fertile earth, buildings of the new Wake Forest College campus are being pushed to completion as the school looks ahead to the move next year and its \$17,500,000 campus.

Georgian in architecture, built around a plaza and four quadrangles, the new 300-acre site was given to Wake Forest by Charles H. Babcock and the late Mary Reynolds Babcock from their Reynolda estate. By moving, Wake Forest will profit by the Z. Smith Reynolds Foundation, which has promised yearly income of "up to the sum which, \$350,000." When the college moves, it plans to enroll about 2,000 students. Anti-Communist Curmishers in Two Red Ships

Witness Says Fuller Had Gun Before Killing

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP)—A witness said today that Albert Fuller was wearing a gun when he saw the former chief deputy sheriff with a A. L. Patterson just before the anti-communist crusader was slain.

Three other witnesses already had told the jury in Fuller's murder trial that the one-time Phenix City lawman was without his pistol when they saw him after the killing. Two of them said he wore an empty holster.

Cecil Padgett, 30-year-old carpenter who testified yesterday that Fuller and a man he identified as Arch Ferrell ran from the scene seconds after the murder last June 18, gave more details this morning under cross-examination by the defense.

Ferrell, who was prosecuting attorney at vice-infested Phenix City, and Fuller are both charged with Patterson's death along with a third defendant, former Alabama Atty. Gen. S. Garrett. Ferrell and Garrett are awaiting trial.

Patterson had been nominated attorney general to succeed Garrett and had promised to clean up the racketeering that had made Phenix City infamous for years.

Padgett said he did not see the gun when he turned around immediately after the shooting and noticed Fuller and Ferrell standing by Patterson's car where the slaying occurred. Neither did he see Fuller or Ferrell with it in their hands as they ran away, in the witness continued.

He said he saw Fuller leaning against the car with his left hand at the top of the door. The defense previously stated that the former chief deputy's fingerprints were found there. Fuller told newsmen he touched the car while getting a Montgomery reporter away from the auto.

A state investigator testified, however, that the defendant told him later he had been careful to avoid touching the car.

Just What Is Speed Limit?

Now that the "whammy" is being used inside city limits, just what is the legal speed limit for Charlotte drivers?

Traffic Capt. Lloyd W. Henkel says you won't get whammed.

Police say 35 MPH is the speed limit for residential driving—neither 30 MPH or MPH as the City Code would indicate—a motorist is safe to drive 35 MPH for residential zones, and 20 MPH for business areas. At all major approaches to the city, signs posted on the highway indicate the lawful speeds are 35 MPH in residential zones.

How can you explain the apparent differences between City Code and State laws?

The Motor Vehicle Laws allow local authorities to reduce the speed limit when a situation demands it. A copy of the Motor Vehicle Laws of North Carolina points out that 35 MPH is legal

Commies Fire Upon Small Island Post

Action Not Believed Threat Of Invasion

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—Nationalist warplanes early today attacked Chinese Communist craft northwest of the tiny island of Wuchiu in the Formosa Strait and destroyed 26,500 tons of cargo, Communist planes returned safely.

Earlier, the Defense Ministry reported Chinese Red gunboats shelled the island when 11 Communist gunboats and armored barges happened to pass by.

A communiqué said two of the Red craft were damaged heavily.

DEFENSE PLEDGED
In Taipei, Nationalist Premier O.K. You told the Legislative Yuan (Parliament) that Chiang Kai-shek's forces were in no circumstances "give up Quemoy and the Matsu without a fight."

Wuchiu is in the Formosa Strait about 19 miles south of Red-berd Nanjhi Island.

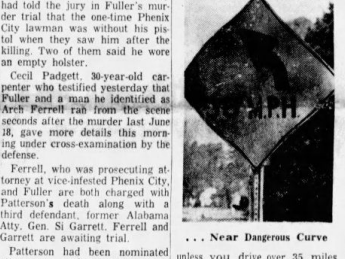
The defense ministry said the ships bombarded military installations, started fires, and returned to have searchlights.

The latest Nationalist report the Reds are shifting forces southward toward the Formosa Strait area comes from the Taitao News Agency, operated by the Interior Ministry.

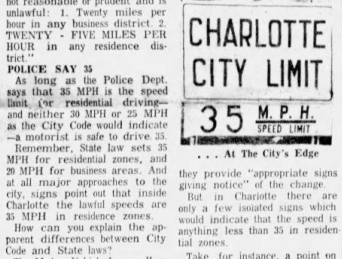
The agency, which specializes in reports from Red China, where it claims to have underground contacts, said a Communist fleet left the north China port of Tsingtau Feb. 20 for the Foshow area of Fukien, opposite the Matsuo group of islands.

The agency said the fleet included six new-type torpedo boats, 20 landing craft, and twelve gunboats.

Most of them, it said, were turned over to Red China by Soviet Russia last November.
