The trouble-making "Rock Hole" is bringing the city a new kind of trouble, this time in the form of complaints from irate businessmen and a \$13,500 claim from an adjacent property owner.

The businessmen involved, mostly along the 2000 block of S. Tryon St., let fly a blast yesterday when high winds whipped through piles of trash and waste paper dumped in the quarry and scattered it over the neighborhood.

Baruch Explains Market Boom

WASHINGTON.—Bernard M. Baruch said today the main cause of the stock price boom are the cumulative effects of the inflationary policies which have followed over the past decade and a half.

"If any economic danger threatens today, it will be found not in the stock market itself but in the effects of this inflationary heritage," the 84-year-old retired financier and adviser to presidents told the Senate Banking Committee today.

Baruch, the final witness in three weeks of public hearings on the state of the market, came out strongly against any tax cuts now. Just as strongly he urged a bigger defense buildup.

STRESSES NEED

Stressing a need for a "sound government policy covering all the interrelated problems of economics, finance and national defense," Baruch made three general recommendations in his prepared testimony.

CRITICIZES BOTH PARTIES

Baruch aimed some plainly implied criticism at the Republicans now in power as well as at Democratic administrations of the past.
The tall, white-haired financier, who made millions in Wall Street, said the stock market is largely a mirror of the whole economy and the economy now is dominated by the cold war.

Bill To Boost N. C. Sales Tax Introduced

RALEIGH — The House received a bill today to increase the retail sales tax from 3 to 3 1/2 per cent. Earlier House and Senate education committees gave approval to legislation which would turn over to local school boards full power over the assignment and enrollment of pupils.

The latest sales tax proposal was tossed in the hopper by Reps. Harry Cozens of Hoke and Clifton Blue of Moore.
In addition to boosting the sales tax rate the Greene-Blue Bill would lift the present \$15 maximum tax on a single article and place under the sales tax the purchases of parts and supplies of motor vehicle fleet owners.

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower, commenting on publication of the Yalta papers, said today there is nothing to be gained by going back 10 years to try to show whether someone may have been wrong.

The President told a news conference he personally never questioned any man's motives. That was in reply to a question as to whether he believed the participants in the 1945 Yalta conference were sincere.
Eisenhower was asked whether he believed publication of the Yalta documents by the State Department last week might "cramp the style" of the leaders of nations at any future big power conference.
The President replied that he hoped that would not occur.
