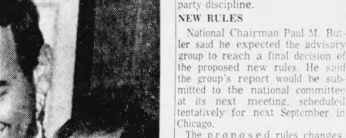

Polio Vaccine Ordered Returned From Mexico HOUSTON (AP) — Customs officials have ordered a 6,000-cubic centimeter shipment of the new Salk polio vaccine returned here from Mexico City.

A customs spokesman said Pan-American Airways officials were told to impound the vaccine and return it here. He said the Houston Customs Office was not advised until Wednesday that foreign shipment of the vaccine was banned the day before.

Some 37 other mills have agreed to renew contracts. Many of them signed with the union as the strike deadline neared.

The firms which refused to renew contracts on an "as is" basis contended that a cut in wages is necessary to meet competition from Southern mills. The management contends there is a 23-cent an hour labor differential which places Northern mills at a disadvantage in competing with Southern mills.

Some damage was reported in the nine-state Southern Bell strike. A 70-bar cable between Atlanta and Birmingham, Ala., was cut and a line between Atlanta and Rome, Ga. A long distance cable connecting Miami, Fla., with Key West, Fla. and Havana, Cuba, was also damaged.

The CWA has said from the start that damage of this sort was not its doing. The union says it is a "strike month old" and that the company's refusal to accept a new contract is a "blockade by union refusal to accept a no-strike clause. The union says such a clause is secondary and that wages and the company's refusal to submit all issues to arbitration are of more importance.
