## RECREATION LEADERS FOR THE SOUTH

The 180-page report recommends an action program for the South which includes three major points: intensified recruitment to increase the number of students prenaring for the field: expansion of undergraduate major curricula in recreation and improvement of graduate major curricula.

in recreation and improvement of graduate major curricula.

More than 4.200 full-time recreation leaders are now employed in the southern region. Employers expect to double this number in the next five years. Fourteen colleges participating in the study reported far fewer recreation graduates finually than are needed to meet the requirements of the expanding field. At the same time the difficulties of providing continuing education on the job for the widely scattered workers have not been overcome. Graduate study opportunities also are limited numerically and geographically.

If the present needs are met in the southern region, the study points out, the colleges with recreation majors would have to award five times as many degrees in recreation annually as they do now. The annual requirements would be more than three times the estimated

THE southern states are badly in need of recreation leaders to serve in communities, youth-serving agencies and educational organizations. The need is growing more rapidly than the colleges and universities can provide trained personnel.


