Fire Kills 9 In Chicago Apartments

CHICAGO, April 8 (AP)—Nine persons died and eight were injured today in a fire which swept a four-story apartment building on Chicago's South Side.

The ninth body was found several hours after the blaze by firemen making a check of the charred flats.

Fire Marshal Albert Peterson said more than 100 persons were in the structure when the blaze started on the first floor and swept up a stairwell. All were Negroes.

French Kill 127 Rebels In Algeria

Mop-Up Is Aimed At Bands in Hills

ALGERS, Algeria, April 8 (UP)—French security forces pushed mop-up operations against Algerian rebels on two widely-separated fronts today after two of the bloodiest clashes in the month-long rebellion in this big North African territory.

Preliminary reports said at least 112 rebels were killed in major fighting in eastern Constantine and western Oran departments. The French reported at least 32 troops killed.

Authorities said that because of the rugged terrain in which the clash took place the rebel death toll may not be known for days.

Fifteen rebels died in scattered fighting elsewhere in Algeria yesterday. The body of a missing French native soldier was recovered. His French sergeant was slain.

French paratroopers stalked through the rugged Nematela Mountains in Constantine today to dig out rebel pockets of resistance. The French claimed at least 63 "army of Allah" rebels were killed in the three-day battle that raged amid troops in both regions to flush out rebels from their mountain hide-outs.

Other fighting was reported in north Constantine where rebels were trapped and killed. Seven more rebels were killed in a clash near Marina, in Oran.

French continued to pour reinforcements into Algeria to suppress the rebellion. Another 800 troops arrived at Oran yesterday.

Reports from Germany said another French division had been pulled out of the Atlantic defenses for action here. France already has seven NATO divisions in Algeria.

Meanwhile, in Tunis at least 24 rebels were reported killed during the past week. Three Frenchmen and eight pro-French Moslems also lost their lives.

Sixteen rebels were killed in a military clamp in a native village 15 miles from Bougie.

WASHINGTON, April 8 (AP)—Sen. George said today the entire files of his special "oil lobby" committee will be made available for the Senate's new broad-scale investigation of lobbying.

The group headed by the Georgia Democrat went out of business yesterday by issuing its final report on the alleged attempt to sway the vote of Sen. Case (R-SD) on the natural gas bill.

Jenner, Eastland Here; Farm Bill Okay Since

President Eisenhower's silence on the farm bill "seems to indicate he's getting ready to sign it," Sen. Jenner (R-Ind) said here Sunday.

Jenner arrived at the Atlanta Airport with Sen. Eastland (D-Miss). The two were on route from New Orleans, where the Senate Subcommittee on Internal Security has been investigating communism.

Jenner, who supported the Benson plan for flexible farm supports, said the secretary of agriculture's branding the bill "not acceptable" is not surprising. But Eisenhower's silence seems to point to his eventual signing of the bill, he said.

Augusta Golf Week for Ike Begins Today

President Eisenhower will arrive in Augusta about noon Monday for a week of golf and relaxation.

Eisenhower has been going to the Augusta National Golf Course the day after the end of the Masters' each year since he took office. His private plane, Columbine III, is scheduled to take off from National Airport about 9:30 a.m. The flight takes about 2 1/2 hours.

Mr. Eisenhower and a small White House staff will accompany the chief executive.

In advance of departure, Eisenhower will confer at the White House with Republican congressional leaders and Secretary of Agriculture Benson. The top subject for discussion is the farm bill.
