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Sheppard Faces More Delay In Appeals Ruling

CLEVELAND (AP)—A pair of appeals by the state against the conviction of Dr. Sam Sheppard may be heard separately, causing a delay in a final appellate court ruling on "petitions."

Arguments are to be held Monday at the state supreme court. It is charged that the second petition—that Judge Edward Binns was in error when he refused to grant Dr. Sam a new trial on the basis of newly found evidence—will be heard at a different time.

The second petition has not yet been filed and state attorneys do not argue on the matter until they have a copy of the petition. Prosecutors and associates with counsel Arthur Peterling met with the appellate court judge Monday to discuss the appeal schedule.
