## CITY COUNCIL MAY SELECT NEW JUDGE

### Basil Boyd In Line For Post Held By J. C. Sedberry

Appointment of a new judge and the reshuffling of the Civil Service Commission today appeared as the prospective major changes in the municipal organization for the next biennium.

The new City Council elected yesterday does not formally take office until next Monday morning. But speculation was rife today regarding the appointment of a new judge to succeed Judge J. C. Sedberry of City Police Court.

And drastic changes in the personnel of the Civil Service Commission were also reported in the morning.

### LIKELY APPOINTEE

Councilman Basil M. Boyd, who ends his career as councilman next Monday morning, was reported as the most likely appointee for the judicial post.

Mr. Boyd made his farewell speech at today's regularly scheduled Council session, but does not officially terminate his office as councilman until the new administration is formally inducted Monday morning.

### FOUR VOTES EXPECTED

Reports were that he would receive sufficient support (four votes constitute a majority) for the judgeship in the City Police Court.

Incumbent councilman re-elected at yesterday's referendum were reluctant to discuss the appointment this early, but there was every indication that Mr. Boyd would get the nod.
