## House Panel Swings Ax, Hits 'Cover-Up' of Spending

WASHINGTON (U)—The House Appropriations Committee cut back President Eisenhower's 1960 budget requests a quarter billion dollars Friday.

The committee coupled its proposed reduction with sharp criticism of what it called an attempted administration cover-up of budget liabilities.

In its work on three previous

regular appropriation bills this session, the committee went over the President's recommendations by about \$60 million dollars.

### HITS SCORE OF AGENCIES

But in sending the fourth regular appropriations bill to the House, Friday, the committee undercut total budget requests to date by voting to deny the President \$253,346,200 contained in budget estimates for a score of independent federal agencies.

### DEFENSE TO ICC

In its action Friday the committee recommended appropriation of \$6,438,839,800 to finance during the fiscal year beginning July 1, operations of independent government agencies ranging from civil defense to the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The bulk of the money, slightly more than five billion dollars, is for the Veterans Administration.

The total contained in the bill is \$253,346,200 less than Eisenhower asked, and \$406,739,147 less than the same agencies were given this year.

### PENSION SETUP HIT

The sharpest criticism was on the financing of the Civil Service retirement fund, out of which come pensions for government employees.

The committee report said the Budget Bureau has refused to approve a Civil Service Commission request for \$773,734,000 to build up the government's contribution to the fund.

"This fund is defunct by over \$30,000,000 and the Bureau of the Budget is certainly unscrupulous in its position when it has not included \$773,734,000 in the budget for 1960 to pay the government's share of the retirement costs," the report said.

"The budget, insofar as it attempts to reflect true government costs for this (1960) year, is understated by such amount."

# Rape Trial Of 4 Is Set For May 27

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (UPI)—Four white youths accused of assaulting a Negro coed in a racial sex crime that shocked this Southern capital and university city pleaded innocent to rape charges Friday.

A jury trial was ordered and trial date set for May 27. The girl was seized at the point of a shotgun from a parked car on the Florida A&M University campus early May 2 and was raped repeatedly.

Rape is punishable by death in the electric chair in Florida, but no white man has ever been executed in this state for raping a Negro.

Trial by jury was mandatory under the plea of innocent entered by each defendant at arraignment before Judge W. May Walker.

Students at Florida A&M, an all-Negro school, have conducted "passive" protest demonstrations and held "prayers for justice" in the case during the past two weeks. Nearly 300 Negro spectators filed a segregated third-floor gallery in the courtroom for the arraignment and talked excitedly in low tones after each defendant entered pleas.

The youths, represented by court-appointed attorneys, spoke in loud, clear voices and showed no signs of nervousness. They were open-necked sports shirts.

# Senate Counsel Gave Advice to Strauss' Foe

WASHINGTON (U)—A staff attorney of the Senate Commerce Committee was disclosed Friday to have helped prepare the testimony of one of the men opposing Lewis L. Strauss' selection as secretary of commerce.

David L. Hill, an atomic scientist who has bitterly criticized Strauss as a foe of science, told the committee under questioning that Kenneth A. Cox suggested some changes which he made in his prepared testimony. Cox, a Seattle lawyer, is employed by the Commerce Committee as special counsel for the hearings on Strauss' nomination. He was appointed by Chairman Warren G. Magnuson (D-Wash.).

Aides to Strauss said they had received little or no help from Cox in preparing their defense against adverse testimony.

Questioning by Sen. Hugh Scott (R-Pa.) brought the disclosure that Hill and Cox had consulted together, but Scott said he was drawing "no implications at all" from it.

# 4-Man Teams Taking Over Steel Talks

NEW YORK (U)—Steel negotiators ended "very constructive" preliminary contract talks Friday and agreed to start streamlined industrywide negotiations Monday.

Four-man teams representing the industry and union will replace individual company bargaining sessions that will decide whether there is to be a July 1 steel strike when present contracts expire.

As the week-long preliminary trading of basic economic arguments came to an end, the opposing sides were clearly far apart.

### FAIRNESS PLEDGED

But United Steelworkers President David J. McDonald joined chief industry negotiator R. Conrad Cooper in pledging to work for a fair and noninflammatory settlement to avoid a strike.

"The union does not want a strike," McDonald said. "It wants a fair contract with improvements earned and justified by the employees' productivity and the industry's profits."

Cooper said any increased steel labor costs would be inflationary, whether requiring price increases or not. He added that while the preliminary talks "have developed better understanding of each other's views," they reflect "substantial differences between us."

### LESS THAN WORKERS'

He said U. S. Steel Corp. data shows that company stockholders enjoy less average income from all sources, including stock dividends, than do steel workers from job earnings.

"Thus the need of the employees appears to be no greater than that of the stockholders," Cooper said. In Washington, General Counsel Jerome D. Fenton of the National Labor Relations Board rejected a bid by union counsel Arthur J. Goldberg for Fenton to investigate steel companies for an alleged lockout plan.

# U.S. Eases Impasse on Atom Ban

GENEVA (AP)—The United States took two careful steps Friday toward Soviet positions on nuclear test suspension issues in an effort to clear the way for hard bargaining on major problems dedocking current talks.

The American government, with full British backing, announced it will study carefully a Soviet proposal for a limited number of on-site inspections of suspicious disturbances. In addition, the two Western powers said they accepted the principle of mixed national and international manning of permanent control posts, provided these posts were staffed with enough foreigners to guarantee efficient operation of the system.

During a two-hour conference session, the Soviet side came forward with a proposal also capable of easing the logjam. Soviet delegate Semyon Tsarapkin said his government accepted the principle of three-power cooperation in working out ways of political difficult-to-detect outer space exploration.

A Western source said such a project would involve putting up artificial satellites of the Sputnik type. The United States, Britain and the Soviet Union would put up their own satellites but would agree on the equipment to be carried aloft and see that reports from these space vehicles were fed back to certain control points for analysis.

U.S. Ambassador James J. Wartsword made Friday's announcements regarding the Western moves.

A Western source gave this summary of his remarks: The Western powers have not bound themselves to accept limited inspection but would be willing to if the Soviet Union could satisfy them concerning the efficient operation of such a system.

# Court-Barred Strike Hits NY Hospitals

NEW YORK (UPI)—Some 3,800 non-professional workers went on strike Friday against six New York hospitals in defiance of a state Supreme Court order.

The union, which is seeking bargaining recognition, threatened to call strikes at nine other hospitals, where an additional 3,800 workers were employed.

The six private, non-profit hospitals immediately affected placed nurses on extra duty and called in volunteers to help care for about 2,500 patients. The Greater New York Hospital Assn. said conditions were nearly normal.

Attorneys for the hospitals said they would institute civil contempt proceedings against the union, its officers and organizers for calling the strike despite a court ban.

A spokesman for the hospital association said that hospitals were planning to hire replacements for the workers who left their jobs.

The strike began at 7 a.m. e.d.t. while Mayor Robert F. Wagner was presiding over a night-long mediation session at City Hall. The meeting broke up at 8 a.m.

# Flier Dies In Carolina Jet Collision

SHAW AIR FORCE BASE, S.C. (AP)—Two Air Force jet bombers collided in flight near here Friday. One of the planes crashed, killing one of its three crew members.

The other two crewmen parachuted to safety. They were minor injuries.

The second plane, its tail and undercarriage damaged, landed at the base. Its crew escaped injury.

A third aircraft, engaged with the other two in formation maneuvers, was not involved in the collision. The FB66 twin-jet planes were attached to a reconnaissance bomber squadron here.

The plane from which the two men parachuted went down in flames.

# Russia Tests Bomber for Space Use

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Senate staff study credits Soviet missile experts with testing a manned rocket bomber planned for a range of 12,000 miles at altitudes up to 100 miles.

The "skip-glide bomber" was listed in a table of missiles and weapons under test by the Soviet Union in a study for the Senate Preparedness Subcommittee. Charles H. Donnelly of the legislative reference service of the Library of Congress made the survey.

The designation "skip-glide" covers a vehicle which would ride its rockets to the fringes of space and soar there until guidance or gravity pulled it back to denser atmosphere. It would bounce off the thicker air, perhaps repeatedly, to continue its glide.

The United States has its own project for such a craft, but has not advanced to the test stage.

Donnelly said he obtained his data from unofficial sources.

Donnelly said the Soviets have two operational medium and long-range ballistic missiles, with ranges of from 400 to 1,800 miles.

The independent man from Independence, Mo., dined on filet mignon, lobster in brandy sauce and a huge seven-egg cake with 75 candles.

Truman, who was scheduled to speak at the dinner, also was the object of friendly jibes, including his love for the Missouri Waltz. But the former President had this rejoinder:

"One of the things I would like to get on the record once and for all is that I never learned the Missouri Waltz."
