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American Culture: Salem's Inspiration

In spite of crude hardships, they never lost the spark of esthetic percep-tion.

But, immediately, settlers were faced with the gigantic problem of survival. They had to clear the wilderness, build homes, wilages and towns. They had to meet the threat of hostile Indians, construct roads, establish communications and commerce. Very soon there was a Revolution and the task of organizing a stable government. As more immigrants arrived, there was the necessity to expand westward to make room for them and to open up new agriculture and industry.

As a result of this primary attention to the physical and material aspects of life, coupled with the religious tenden-cies which were always very strong in our early settlers, we hardly had time for any broad pursuit of culture or any large body of art.

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But around Old Salem, some settlers did have time. And the example they set is inspiring—even today.

Certainly the music of Old Salem is derivative. It draws strongly on European forms and traditions. But the important point is that, in the midst of great tasks, these people had time for a "broad pursuit of culture."

Modern Americans—with great tasks still before them—can learn much from the Moravians of Old Salem Here in this growing land of ours is a fertile seedbed for the development of a great culture. Native materials for art are everywhere—waiting to be seized and shaped. It remains only for modern Americans to eather up the tools and go to work—with some of the artistic real of Old Salem's Moravians—to achieve the coal of a national culture, fashioned from native materials and supported by the creative genius of native artists.
