## Trooper Is Feared Slain by Gunman

EAST LANSING, Mich. (AP)—A posse of state policemen halted its grim search Friday night for a missing fellow trooper feared slain after questioning an ex-convict about a \$75 robbery.

The search was called off because of darkness. State police said 43 troopers aided by aircraft would resume the hunt for Trooper Albert Souden, 29, at dawn Saturday.

State Police Commissioner Joseph A. Childs, personally directing the search, said a chance that Souden still is alive is very slight.

Alvin W. Knight, 40-year-old ex-convict and a one-time mental patient, was found in a woodland cabin with the missing trooper's gun in his belt. He denied any knowledge of the trooper's whereabouts and said he bought the policeman's service pistol from a hitchhiker for \$10.

#### CRASH INTO CABIN

Troopers crashed into Knight's cabin in northern Michigan Friday and seized him as he lay in bed. Knight offered no resistance although officers found another gun in the cabin in addition to Souden's. They also found a shovel they said was "freshly used."

The hunt for Souden was concentrated in Livingston County about 160 miles from the cottage where Knight was seized. The state police car driven by Souden Thursday was found abandoned there on a river bank near Knight's home.

#### NO BLOOD

No signs of blood or a struggle were found in the car. Souden's billfold and personal papers were found shortly afterward in a water hole about a quarter mile from the abandoned auto.

Souden last was seen in the car at Knight's house in Howell where he had gone from the Brighton state police post to question Knight about a \$75 tool company burglary.

Neighbors said Souden emerged from the house with Knight after a few minutes. They said Knight got into a blue Cadillac and drove off, followed by Souden in the state police car.

The Cadillac was found parked at Knight's isolated cottage.

## Fronzizi Gives In to Army Boss

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP)—President Arturo Fronzizi bowed to the demands of dissident army leaders Friday and brought back as army commander-in-chief the general who was fired three days ago.

The reappointment of Gen. Carlos Toranzo Montero apparently quelled a threatened revolt by military chiefs.

The fast reshuffle also brought the resignation of Elvo Anaya as secretary of war. He was succeeded by Gen. Rodolfo Larcher, a friend of Toranzo Montero and his army supporters.

Toranzo Montero Thursday night defied Anaya's orders with the backing of what he said was 93 per cent of all Argentine army officers.

## PRESIDENT RELAXES IN SCOTLAND

## Ike Goes Golfing, Invites De Gaulle

TURNBERRY, Scotland (AP)—President Eisenhower went golfing in Scotland Friday after renewing an invitation to French President De Gaulle to visit the United States "before too long."

The invitation was contained in a letter Eisenhower wrote just before he left Paris to fly to Scotland in the morning.

In a gesture of extreme warmth toward De Gaulle, Eisenhower followed the letter with a plane saying: "We in the U.S. government will deem it a great privilege to maintain close contact with you and your government."

#### SHOOTS AN 89

Texts of the letter and radio message were disclosed by White House press secretary James C. Hagerty in Scotland.

While Hagerty was holding a news conference in Ayr, the President was finishing his first 18 holes of golf at the Ailsa course in Turnberry.

The President shot an 89, 18 over par. It was the first time he had seen the tough championship course laid out along the edge of the Scottish coast.

The President flew to Scotland, and another big welcome from the people for three days of rest and golf after a strenuous set of conferences in West Germany, Britain, and France. The talks were a prelude to his coming exchange of visits with Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

#### IN GIFT APARTMENT

He moved into a 16-room apartment at Culzean Castle, lavish rooms which were given to him for life by the Scottish people for his leadership in World War II.

Hagerty said the President plans to start the return flight to Washington Monday morning.

In his letter to De Gaulle, Eisenhower spoke of the "warmth of the welcome I have received in France, the hospitality you yourself have extended to me and my party."

## Ike to Meet Soviet Boss Sept. 15

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower and Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev will hold their first conference Sept. 15 at the White House, five hours after the Soviet leader arrives for his 13-day visit.

The White House disclosed this Friday in making public further details of Khrushchev's itinerary. The details cover the first two days which will be spent in the Washington area.

The program, still labeled tentative, includes a dinner at the White House the night of Sept. 15, which the Eisenhower will give for Khrushchev and his wife. The next morning Khrushchev is to go to the government's agricultural experiment station at Beltsville, Md.

Khrushchev will speak Sept. 16 at a National Press Club luncheon.

Khrushchev and his wife will give a return dinner for the Eisenhower Sept. 16 at the Soviet Embassy.

MOSCOW (AP)—Premier Nikita Khrushchev disclosed Friday night he is going to Peking Sept. 29, the day after he returns from his visit to the United States.

## House Votes Saving Bond Rate Boost

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Friday passed a bill allowing the Treasury to increase the interest rate on "E" and "H" savings bonds from 3 1/4 to 3 3/4 per cent.

The vote was 378-7.

By its action, the House went along only partly with President Eisenhower's request for legislation in this field.

Eisenhower asked also for lifting of the present 4 1/2 per cent ceiling in the interest rate on maturing government bonds maturing in five years or longer.

## AFRAID TO GIVE ADDRESS

## Teen Hoods Beat, Rob N.Y. Man, 74

NEW YORK (UPI)—Three teen-aged boys beat and robbed a 74-year-old man sleeping on the beach at Coney Island Friday in another vicious outbreak of juvenile violence.

The man was so terrified when brought into the police station to confront the toughs that he refused to give his address for fear of reprisals.

One of the boys, an ex-convict at 16, smirked and patted his pompadour hair as he was identified as the one who had punched the man in the face while the others held him.

The attack was the latest in a swelling tide of juvenile crime that led Mayor Robert F. Wagner Thursday to order more than 1,400 men added to the police force. Wagner met Friday afternoon with Gov. Nelson Rockefeller to coordinate plans in the crime fight.

The appearance of Hector Bouillere, 17, before Judge Gerald P. Cuklin in General Sessions Court, meanwhile, was in sharp contrast to the usual demeanor of teen-aged gang members.

Polite, soft-spoken and wearing a clean, white shirt, Bouillere was held in \$50,000 bail—for his own protection as a material witness in last Sunday's gang slaying of two boys in a Hell's Kitchen playground.

Authorities said Bouillere had witnessed "numerous acts" involving the fatal gang assault led by Salvatore (Dracula) Agron, 34, and Luis (Umbrella Man) Hernandez, 17.

#### SECOND IN YEAR

This will be his second visit to Peking in little more than a year. His first conference with Mao Tse-tung there last summer was followed by a switch in Soviet tactics toward a summit conference.

Khrushchev had accepted a Western proposal for a meeting of government chiefs within the framework of the U.N. Security Council on the 1958 Mideast crisis. He appeared ready to go to New York for such a meeting.

After his return from Peking the Soviet Union unceremoniously shifted ground to put the crisis in the hands of the U.N. General Assembly. Western diplomats regarded this as a major retreat and Khrushchev's first serious public setback.

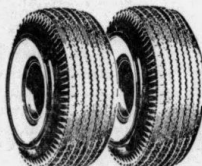
