Sones said the options to accept only trash from the East Valley were proposed because, many years ago, Lopez Canyon served only the East Valley while other landfills served the rest of the city.

today to discuss a recycling plan that includes options for closing Lopez Canyon. However, city officials say it is unlikely that the council will use the occasion to make a final decision on the landfill.

By taking trash only from the East Valley, the city would dramatically reduce the use of Lopez Canyon. The East Valley generates about 800 tons, or 22% of the 3,700 tons of trash the city puts into Lopez Canyon each day, Sones said.

Clearly, what the Bureau of Sanitation is doing is trying to confuse the issue and delay the process to push the city in a corner with no other option but to extend the life of the landfill, said Councilman Richard Alarcon, a long-
