Civil Service Rule Changed

Only men with residency in Mecklenburg need apply for jobs with the police and fire department, the City Civil Service Commission has decided.

Yesterday the commission voted to restrict residency for filing applications strictly to Mecklenburg County and recommended that applicants for the two departments post cash or a bond covering the cost of a physical exam.

If the physical is failed or if passed and the applicant fails to work, the deposit is refunded. But if the test is passed and the applicant does not take the job, it will be forfeited.

Another action taken by the commission which is proving to be controversial was the vote to eliminate requirements of a high school education for police and fire department applicants.

And the commission urged that the City Council recommend to state legislature a change in the age of applicants from 30 to 28.

Furniture Meet Opens Tomorrow

Kennedy Puts Rap On Ike And Nixon

WINSTON-SALEM (P.—Enthusiastic Young Democrats voted on officers and resolutions today after hearing Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) tell the Republicans in the principal address of their state-wide convention here last night.

Kennedy, 39, who missed out on the vice presidential nomination during the national party convention at Chicago, called the Democratic party the "party of youth and vigor."

NIXON FUTURE

He said when "President Eisenhower talks about the Republican party being the 'Party of the Future,' he's actually talking about the future of Richard M. Nixon, The Democratic party is the party that offers progress and vision instead of inaction and stagnation; the party that offers real leadership, the kind of leadership young people want."

Kennedy was introduced by Sen. Tom Scott who said he had voted for Sen. Estes Reelfover for vice president. "But you like to have got me, Senator, and you would have been all right with me if you had gotten the nomination," Scott declared.

The keynote address was delivered by David A. Bunn of Denver, Colo., president of the Young Democratic Clubs of America.

Among resolutions to be voted on today was one which would extend the term of office for national committeemen and national committeewomen for one year to two with each being elected on alternate years.

Those already announced for state office include: for president, Tom Davis of Selma and Steve Nunnicks of Fayetteville; for national committeeman, William Z. Wood of Winston-Salem and William Smith of Charlotte and Raleigh; for national committeewoman, Miss Betty June Hayes of Hillsboro; vice presidents of the Middle District, Mrs. Annie Frank Bowland of Graham and Al F. Sigmon of North Wilkesboro; state secretary, Johnny Ray Hendron of Statesville; for treasurer, Jim Nolan, North Carolina State College student.

Kennedy's speech followed a tape recorded speech of welcome by Adlai E. Stevenson, Democratic presidential candidate.

Kennedy knocked Secretary of State J. Foster Dulles, telling the 45 cheering delegates, "Dulles may lead us to the brink of war, but it is the young men and women of the country who must fight it."

"The United States must make a strong stand on foreign policy. It is not enough to be at peace. It is possible to lose the cold war while peace is all around us."

"The statement that that neutralism is immoral, made by Dulles," Kennedy continued, "alienated our relations with many of our allies abroad."

Kennedy said that credit for farmers under the Farmers Home Administration has "been steadily declining while interest rates have been raised." He said it now is almost impossible to get a loan from the Small Business Administration.

In his keynote speech, Bunn said the best way to prevent war is to present a strong front in times of peace. He added that he resented Republican charges that the Democratic Party is the "War" party.
