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Many ask what to do about hemorrhoids. In many cases, all that one needs is to keep fecal material from becoming hard and bulky. The passage of large hard masses can tear the hemorrhoids and thus produce bleeding. Sometimes it causes the blood to clot in a bruised hemorrhoid, and then the person suffers great pain for ten days or so. The person will then feel distress on sitting down.

Obviously, a good way to keep from getting trouble with hemorrhoids is to keep the bowel movement fairly soft, with the help of some canned fruit or mineral oil or a small dose of compound licorice powder. When a mass of hard feces is present it should not be forced out until some warm water or mineral oil has been put into the bowel.

Scores of persons who have had hemorrhoids removed by someone who was not very expert have assured me that never again would they ever let anyone operate on their piles unless he was an able and experienced specialist in this field.

An inexperienced surgeon can perform an operation which will leave the person's anus most uncomfortable for the rest of his days. It may be too tight or too loose or too sore or always wet.

MANY PERSONS ask about the injection treatment for hemorrhoids. All I can say is that at the Mayo Clinic where a number of our surgeons treat hemorrhoids all day and every day they do not dare use the injection treatment.

They might get by for a time but then along might come a person so highly sensitive to the drug injection, that as a result part of the rectal wall would slough out, leaving a nasty big wound.

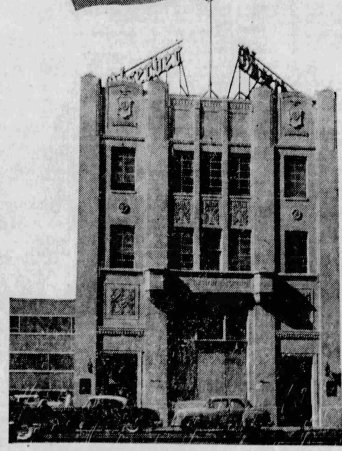
