GYMNASTICS: A tri-meet with Wake Forest and Old Dominion is one of the highlights of the season for Coach Fred Saunders. The match begins at 2:00 p.m., also at home.

UNC Admissions Future Looks Black

H. Bently Renwick, assistant director of undergraduate admissions, commented Thursday that the University is faced with two major problems in increasing the number of black students accepted into the University—"will they consider coming here to begin with, and can they get the financial aid necessary for them to stay in school?"

"I've been to over 150 black and predominantly black high schools since the beginning of the school year," said Renwick, "and I've been able to dispel a

lot of ill feeling against UNC held by black guidance counselors; but if we don't get the financial aid that is vital for most black students, we'll be in a lot of trouble."

Renwick indicated that the University is in a good position to get the "best black talent" from the state at this time "but the University must show an interest in having these people here."

Once the student has decided to come here, according to Renwick, the next and most formidable difficulty is getting financial aid. "This University doesn't have enough scholarships and financial aid for black

students," Renwick said. "Other schools, particularly those of the northeast, make more appealing scholarships offers to black students and then follow through with them."

Renwick felt the major ill feeling against UNC by black high school students was based on the University's unusually high minimum Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) score of 800.

"I feel," commented Renwick, "that the SAT scores of black students should be de-emphasized because many of them are test blind—they don't score well on aptitude tests because they aren't used to taking that type of test, they just don't test very well."

"Actually," he added, "special overall considerations should be given to black students. This may look like segregation in reverse, but why not?"

Renwick noted other improvements he would like to see in University admissions of black students: A tutorial program for "high risk" students, a group of 50 students being admitted to the university who would not be admitted under normal requirements, should be started.

"We also need to form a committee of students to act as big brothers and sisters to these students especially during the freshman orientation program," he added.

Renwick again criticized the SAT score requirement in relation to the case of the

black athlete seeking entry into UNC.

"We miss out on a lot of good people, both black and white, because of this requirement."

Renwick cited Kent Merritt, a high school senior from Charlottesville, Virginia, as an example of an outstanding black athlete being recruited to Carolina.

"In my opinion, Kent is the best running back in this part of the country," said Renwick. "I and the football coaching staff hope that he will choose to come to Carolina next year."

Renwick forecasted

admission of between 200 and 250 black students for next fall's freshman class, and again emphasized the importance of financial aid in the determination of the magnitude of this number.

"Many black students who would have come here last year didn't because of the lack of sufficient financial aid," he explained.

"It's not a question of whether black students will be accepted by the University, but rather will the students accept us."

On the question of general admission increases and policy changes in the coming year,

Director of Undergraduate Admissions Richard G. Cashwell said next year's freshman class will definitely have more women.

"The magnitude of this increase is still under consideration," he said, "but there definitely will be more female students."

Cashwell described the source of this increase as primarily coming from in-state students, but stated there would be no overall increase in admissions or lowering of the entrance requirements.

On general admissions policy, he said in-state men would receive word from the University about their application sometime between Jan. 1 and April 15.

"We try to get all rejection notices back to the students as soon as possible," he commented. "At any rate, we try to get some kind of response to everybody by April 15."

Chadwick Joins WCAR Staff

Recognizing the popularity of the sports program on this campus and throughout North Carolina, WCAR is trying to bring the students a more realistic picture of what really happens. Rather than, as the latest addition to their staff, Dave Chadwick, point out, merely seeing the basketball players "run up and down the court," the Carolina student who listens to the daily sports broadcasts can get to know not only the players, but the less known sports.

According to WCAR sports director Greg Hooker, the station plans to give as much attention as possible to all sports events on campus, and as immediately as possible, WCAR has already broadcast

one play-by-play account, that of the Blue and White game at the beginning of the basketball season, and more are planned. At the present, sports news is offered four times each day except Sunday. At 8:25 a.m., 5:25 p.m. and 9:25 p.m.

Howard Cosell, of ABC radio, gives a summary of the daily events in sports on the national scene. Cosell, the most controversial and biggest name in radio sports, has a bigger mouth than Bill Currie, said Hooker. He might be called the "mouth of the country," Hooker follows Cosell at 5:25 and 9:25 and covers North Carolina, ACC and campus sports. At 11:25 a.m. he summarizes the day's events in a commentary.

Sunday, TVWMP major and Tar Heel cager Dave Chadwick takes over at 9:25. In a

program conceived to "give an in-depth look at the basketball program here at Carolina," Chadwick views his program as "a chance for the student to meet and know the players."

The station manager, George Doyle, saw Chadwick on the "Dean Smith Show" on regional television earlier in the season, and saw the chance to offer inside information that can be given only by someone who has been a part of the action. Since many students are interested in a radio and sports announcing future, WCAR considers the experience given to such persons a very important part of the program. Hooker and Chadwick plan to include all sports on programs continuing into the spring. After the basketball season, Chadwick plans to include "a broad presentation of all campus sports using the same format from the basketball program."

WCAR plans to continue and expand its present service to Carolina students. Now serving more than 4500

students, the station reaches most residence colleges and hopes to include all before the end of this semester. Next fall, WCAR will cover all sports news, provide personal interviews, available scores and, hopefully, live broadcasts.

Rugby Club To Hold Meeting

The UNC Rugby Club will begin its spring season this Monday with a meeting at 10 p.m. in the upstairs lounge of the Student Union. All old players and anyone wishing to play this season are invited.

Formal practice will begin Tuesday on the field next to Carmichael Auditorium.

UNC will open its rugby season March 7 with a match against past National Champion Old Blue of New York. That match plus five others; USC, Rutgers, Duke, Lynchburg, and Old Dominion will be played at home. NC State, Atlanta and a seven Tournament at Duke will make up the away schedule.
