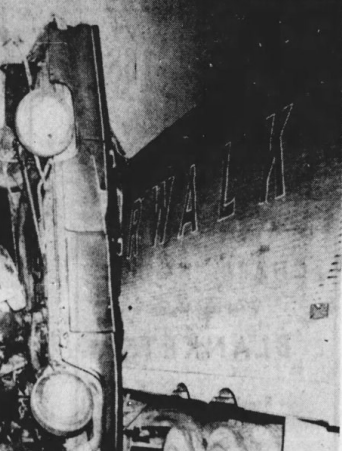

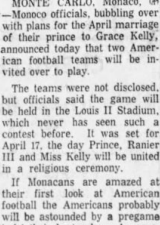
Caid Can Look At A Queen
