Censorship Board Backed By Sheriffs Draws Opposition

RALEIGH (UPI)—Two sponsors of an obscenity bill and its sole opponent in the 1957 House of Representatives agreed Friday they were strongly opposed to a censorship board as proposed by the North Carolina Sheriffs Assn.

Rep. Thomas Turner of Greensboro, who stood alone against the present law, claimed he was "an advocate of free thinking and liberty" and was against "censorship" of any kind.

Rep. Tom Dill of Rocky Mount and L. T. Valentine Jr. of Nashville, co-sponsors of the original bill killed in a House committee which substituted the one that passed in 1957, both said they were satisfied with the present law and would "oppose any change."

John R. Morris of Wilmington, secretary-treasurer of the N.C. Sheriffs Assn., said Thursday that sheriffs were not satisfied with the law empowering them to ban pornographic literature and said the group might seek to get a censorship board established.

Morris' suggestion was made to sheriffs attending a jail management course at the University of North Carolina this week. He proposed that the committee be composed of the superintendent of public instruction, chairman of the Public Welfare Department, newsmen and church representatives.

He said such a proposal was "still in the formative stage" and added it would be studied further by the association.

Turner said he felt he "was old enough to know what to read and I'm not sure, but I feel I know what my children should read." He added he was in favor of getting the present law repealed rather than changed.

Dill said the present law as written was constitutional but explained "I don't think a censorship board-type would be."

He claimed the current bill was as far as the Legislature could go.

Senator Planning Bill To Promote Farm Diversity

RALEIGH (UPI)—State Sen. John Jordan Jr. of Wake County said he was planning to introduce a bill that will help farmers switch from "one-money" crops to diversified farming.

The freshman senator said the bill was "built along lines of the federal farm and home plan being tried in North Carolina on a test basis."

The legislation would help farmers get the maximum benefit from land and water resources. He said he felt his "plan would work well on a statewide basis and help pull the per capita income of the state from 45th place in the nation which resulted from loss of farm income."

Alabama Textile Chain, S.C. Mill Increase Wages

A big Alabama textile chain and a key South Carolina mill have announced wage increases for employees to follow a trend rapidly spreading through the Southern cotton mill belt.

There were indications, also, that the trend may soon reach into the woolen mill side of the industry.

Latest to announce wage increases were the Avondale Mills, which operates seven plants in Alabama, and the Joana Mills at Joana, S.C.

Avondale President Craig Smith announced that some 4,500 employees will be raised to a minimum of \$12.5 an hour effective Feb. 15. Smith said the increase will add \$1,200,000 to the company's annual payroll.

Joana Mills, which employs about 1,700 persons said its wage boost will become effective Feb. 15. However, Walter Regency, vice president and general manager, didn't specify the amount of the boost. He said it would be the general pattern of increases announced by numerous mills in the South in the past few days.

The general pattern of wage increases is expected to settle about the \$12.55 hourly minimum recently announced at the huge Cannon Mills at Concord and Kannapolis.

Since the Cannon announcement a week ago more than a dozen textile chains and individual plants have boosted wages.

There were reports that at least two more woolen mill chains plan to announce wage increases soon.

Allocation Boost For N.C. Retarded Children Sought

CHARLOTTE (AP) — The General Assembly will be asked to double its allocation for the care of mentally retarded children.

Mrs. G. B. Bryant of Charlotte said the State Assn. of Retarded Children will ask for an increase from \$27 to \$60 per child per year. She is executive secretary of the association.

Mrs. Bryant said there are more than 300 trainable retarded children in special classes, but she estimated there are about 15,000 children in the state with I.Q.'s of from 25 to 50. This is the basis on which children are accepted for classes.

She said parents of children attending classes are required to pay \$10 a month in addition to the state grant of \$27 per child. The remaining costs are underwritten by civic clubs.

Will Consider New Law Drafts

Henderson Attorney Heads Constitution Change Unit

RALEIGH — A young Henderson attorney who has been practicing law for nine years and lawmaking for five months will become the head of a unit that will determine the fate of North Carolina's 90-year-old State Constitution.

A. A. (for Algoner Augustus) Zollcofer Jr. was named Friday by State House of Representatives Speaker Addison Hewlett, to serve as chairman of the House Committee on Constitutional Amendments.

To Zollcofer's committee will come the proposed new State Constitution, drafted by a 14-member commission of prominent Tarheel attorneys headed by Durham's Victor S. Bryant Sr.

Also to Zollcofer's committee, presumably, must come the basic portions of the court improvement program recommended by the N.C. Bar Assn.'s Committee on Improving and Expediting Justice, (the Bell Committee).

Zollcofer's appointment to the highly important post came as a surprise to most House members. Not because they questioned his ability, but because he is starting only his second term in the Legislature.

However, a friend of Zollcofer's said: "You've got to remember, James Madison and Alexander Hamilton were about 600 years ago when they wrote the American Constitution — and it's lasted for a couple of centuries."

Zollcofer and his committee likely will not be writing a new constitution. They'll more probably be amending the proposed master state law drafted by Bryant's commission.

You've got to be mighty careful when you change something that has served the people of North Carolina for as long as our present constitution.

"This conceivably could be the most important and the most enduring work to come out of this Legislature for the reason that the 1961 Legislature (and any future Legislature) can't change a constitution as it can amend or repeal statutory acts."

Of the controversial Bell Committee report, Zollcofer said: "There is a definite need for the Bell report. But whether it is as feasible remains to be determined after close study. And you could say the same."

Zollcofer said he is "fortunate that some very able men are on the committee with me who have had considerable experience."

Population Trends Would Decide Reapportionment Bill Planned By Legislator

RALEIGH (UPI) — State Sen. John Jordan Jr. of Wake County said Friday he was preparing a bill to put reapportionment under a special commission to automatically adjust representation according to population trends.

He said his bill would take reapportionment power away from the General Assembly.

He said he understood the Study Commission on Constitutional Revision was planning to recommend that the speaker of the House of Representatives be given reapportionment authority and endorsed it.

But, he said his bill, which he expected to be ready about Feb. 10, would provide for a commission made up of elected officials.

Reapportionment has always been a hot issue with the Legislature. The General Assembly has failed to take any action for several sessions and the issue is expected to be a major problem with the current legislation.
