In doing so while employed as a solicitor, he subjected himself to the right of Warren County to fire him if the county deemed that its duty, which it did not.
The substance of his counsel was a matter for his own conscience to prescribe, and for the witnesses to accept or reject. This nation has not established penalties for non-definitions of wrong thinking.
Mr. Walter attributes to Gilliland the refusal of the witnesses to talk, and judges the witnesses guilty of "obscuring" with being a part of the international conspiracy.
There is a law against participation in an international conspiracy. The guilt rests with those who participate, not with those who refuse to say it is true. If the witnesses are more to be feared as a threat than pill for incredible stupidity, the Justice Department, which poses and administers the law, should be the hearing should find them innocent.
We hold to our faith for the witnesses who do not talk, and with which Mr. Gilliland represented them. We do have an absolute faith in this nation's system of laws, including the right of any accused to counsel. There is no place in that system for the vindictive spirit of justice that provoked Mr. Walter's vituperation.
