Warming Forecast For Area

The temperature dipped to 31 degrees this morning, the lowest ever recorded in Charlotte this late in the spring.

First indications were that the cold weather to which Charlotteans woke up would not prove damaging to the fragile fruit crops of the Carolinas.

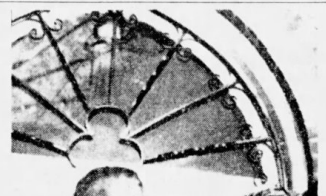
The influx of cold, dry air that hit Charlotte is expected to be short-lived. The weatherman said a high of 67 is in sight for today, and tonight's low will be about 45 degrees, well above last night's 31.

Elsewhere in the Carolinas, the readings went this way: Charlotte, S. C. 47; Myrtle Beach, S. C. 42; Winston-Salem, N. C. 41.

The official forecast calls for fair and warmer weather everywhere in the states—and considerably warmer weather for today's overcast Charlotteans.

'Sucker' Type Foreign Aid Draws Attack

Richards Has Harsh Words For 'Bidding'

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Richards (D-S.C.) said today the United States should not let itself be played off for suckers by countries promoting rival foreign aid offers from this country and Russia.

Richards, chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, and Rep. Vorys (R-Ohio), a senior Republican member, joined in endorsing the theme of a basic decision President Eisenhower is reported to have made for a tougher foreign aid policy.

Eisenhower has yet to communicate the specifics of the new policy to the House committee, which is considering his request for nearly five billion dollars in new foreign aid funds next fiscal year.

It was reported the policy was stimulated by Egypt Premier Nasser's warning that if the United States and Britain did not meet his requirements for construction of the Aswan Dam he still had a veto over the project.

Richards said that in combating the new Communist approach of economic aid offers "we've got to approach this from a common sense view."

It is right for Eisenhower, he said, to see that we are not played off for suckers by countries trying to have Washington and Moscow bid against each other to see who can make the biggest foreign aid offer.

However, neither Richards nor Vorys, who spoke in separate interviews, talked of any present intention of seeking a hard-anti-"antibolshevik" provision in the foreign aid bill. Any such policy would be difficult to write in legislation.

Father Is Happy

Margaret Truman To Wed Newsman

INDEPENDENCE, Mo. (AP)—Harry S. Truman's daughter Margaret gets married today.

The blonde-haired girl who grew to young womanhood in the White House and Clifton Daniel Jr., the foreign correspondent who wooed and won her in a whirlwind romance, exchange vows in little Trinity Episcopal Church.

After a brief reception in the big, white-framed Truman home at 219 N. Delaware St., they will fly to Nassau for a honeymoon of two weeks.

And her father, the former President, can relax from the ordeal that every father of a bride can understand.

"I am happy because Margaret is happy," he said. "The more I see of Margaret's young man the better I like him."

Neighbors approve Daniel, 43, assistant to the foreign editor of the New York Times, and the 24-year-old radio actress-angel pursued their arm-in-arm course about Independence while Truman's neighbors looked on approvingly but with a minimum of hubbub.

Wedding day dawned with pre-marital events moving like clockwork on the quiet and simple pattern upon which mother, father and daughter agreed.

Six Children Die In Blaze

WASHINGTON (AP)—Six children died and three were severely burned in an oil-fed fire that swept through a two-story row house in southwest Washington today.
